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Hager, Nichols to Battle for Title On Saturday Card

Tex Hager, who only two short years ago was a world title contender, will get a chance to annex the Pacific coast junior heavyweight wrestling championship at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night. The announcement was made by Matchmaker Don Owen who promises a three-star show.

Hager, who won two of three falls from Georges Dusette in a great match here last Saturday, will take on Jackie Nichols, sensational Bostonian who won the coveted crown from Canadian Herb Parks a month ago.

Hager, who defeated Dusette in an overtime match here several weeks ago for the right to meet Nichols, suffered a back injury that prevented his appearance. Dusette took his place and wrestled Nichols to a draw. Hager displayed a potent inside toe hold against Dusette, and many local fans are anticipating an upset when the "Creswell Cyclone" meets the champ this week. The back injury is entirely well.

The semi-final match on this week's promising program will feature a newcomer—Dave Reynolds, sensational youngster from Salt Lake City. Reynolds will meet the rough and tough hill-billy from Tennessee—Stocky Kneib. The opener will match Jack O'Reilly against Mike "Cry-baby" London.

The program promises to be a thrill-packed evening of mat hostilities and will likely attract one of the largest crowds of the season. Fans are warned to make ringside seat reservations early in the week.

The Hager-Nichols match is expected to be more than a championship battle. The skirmish is certain to be one of the greatest scientific engagements in local mat history—clean and fast, but lacking nothing in the way of color and dynamic action.

Angels and Oaks Win Coast Games

Los Angeles and Oakland were top dogs today in the first stage of the postseason Pacific Coast League governor's cup playoffs as the aftermath of some mighty fancy baseball and heroics last night.

The pennant-winning Angels downed third-place Portland, 2-1, in a stubborn, 11-inning thriller and fourth-place Oakland topped second-place San Francisco, 2-0, on the two-hit pitching of Will Hefey.

Leftfielder Clarence Maddern was the Angel hero again last night. Eddie Sauer was on first base with a single in the last of the eleventh, there were two out

and the count was 3-2 on Maddern when he singled. Sauer raced all the way from first, sliding and scoring as the Beaver catcher, Charley Silveira dropped Danny Escobar's throw in.

The game had been tied 1-1 from the third inning, as Portland Pitcher Tommy Bridges mowed down the Angels regularly, getting 14 strikeouts in all. Bob McCall, starting for Los Angeles, retired in the eighth with a blistered finger. The old reliable Jess Dobson won the ball game, the 56th appearance for him this year. The Angels got seven hits and Portland six.

It was Maddern who on Monday night walloped a grand slam homer in the eighth to bust wide open a scoreless tie, won by the Angels, 5-0, over San Francisco to give Los Angeles the PCL pennant.

Portland scored in the first inning last night on Escobar's single and Dick Wenner's double. Los Angeles tied it in the third on Lou Stringer's double and Ed Malone's single.

Hefey's stellar pitching for the Oakland victory was in a game scoreless until the first of the ninth. The Oaks got their runs then with two out as Dario Lodigiani singled, Bill Raimondi doubled and Hefey tripled to deep right.

Slim crowds watched the play-offs, 3,202 at San Francisco and 2,870 at Los Angeles. The teams play again tonight, the selected pitchers being: Los Angeles, Russ Bauers (10-8); Portland, Vince di Biasi (13-8); San Francisco, Bob Chesnes; Oakland, Damon Hayes.

Six-Man Football Schedule Drawn

Yanks Win First Game of Series

YANKEE STADIUM, New York, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The old Yankee big inning formula worked again Monday as the New Yorkers shattered 21-year-old Ralph Branca's no-hit bid with five runs in the fifth frame for a 5-3 triumph over Brooklyn before a record 73,365 turnout in the opening game of the 1947 World Series.

Twelve Yanks had been retired in succession by fast-balling Branca, the Dodgers' 21-game winner, until they cut loose with their big flurry that completely unnerved the Brooklyn right-hander.

Branca was followed by Hank Behrman and Hugh Casey, Frank Shea, who started for the Yanks, was lifted for a pinch hitter and succeeded by Joe Page as the big series opened according to the script with a battle of the bullpen—Page vs. Casey.

The big crowd, that included Governor Thomas Dewey and Secretary of State Marshall and set a new high for a single series game, sensed the possibility of real series drama as Branca mowed down the hitless Yanks for four innings. Twice this year he had pitched no-hitters against the St. Louis Cardinals until the ninth inning.

DiMaggio Starts Fireworks

Joe DiMaggio cracked Branca's defense with a single to Pee Wee Reese's left, beating the little fellow's throw for the first hit. Branca, losing his poise suddenly, couldn't find the plate and walked George McQuinn on four straight balls.

Billy Johnson, up to bunt, was hit on the left arm by a Branca pitch and the bases were loaded to put the Brooks' 1-0 lead, resulting from a first inning run, in danger.

Johnny Lindell, replacing the ailing Charley Keller in left field for the Yanks, smashed a double that just barely remained in fair territory down the left field line, scoring both DiMaggio and McQuinn. After DiMaggio passed Phil Rizzuto to again load the bases and threw two balls to Pinch Hitter Bobby Brown, batting for Shea, Manager Burt Shotton sent Coach Clyde Sukeforth to the hill to yank Branca.

Hank Branca, the fellow Pittsburgh couldn't use, strode in to complete the job of walking Brown, forcing across Johnson with the third run.

George Stinewiss forced Lindell with his bounce to Jackie Robinson but managed to beat Bruce Edwards' peg to first trying for the double play. Tommy Henrich then followed with a line single to left, driving home both Rizzuto and Brown.

One Inning Enough

That was all the Yankee scoring and all they needed as it turned out although Shea and Page both had their anxious moments. In the first inning the Brooks got off flying with a run that loomed larger and larger as Branca mowed down the Yanks. Robinson, the speed merchant of the Brooks, walked with one out and stole second as Larry Berra bounced his throw to the bag.

When Pete Reiser smashed the ball back to Shea, Robinson was run down between second and third, allowing enough time for Reiser to reach second base. Dixie Walker dropped a fly into short left field that Lindell appeared to lose in the sun or high cross wind and it fell in for a single, scoring Reiser with the first run of the series.

Yanks in Trouble

After the big inning, Page bumped into difficulty in the sixth. Eddie Stanky singled but was forced by Robinson. Reiser scattered a single to first base, McQuinn missing Pete as he hus-

led by in the base line. After Walker skied out, Pinch Hitter Carl Furillo singled to center, scoring Robinson.

Pee Wee Reese's single, a stolen base and Page's two-base wild pitch, while working on Stanky, permitted Reese to score the third and final Brook run in the seventh.

Shea received credit for the win, allowing only two singles in five innings while Left Page yielded two runs and four hits in four frames. Branca, who gave only two hits was charged with the loss in his first World Series appearance.

Thus Shea added to the accomplishment of becoming the first rookie pitcher in American League history to be honored with an opening series assignment by also winning it.

The big crowd, topping the previous high of 69,990 set Oct. 7, 1943 also set a new record in gate receipts at \$325,828.70 as compared to the previous high of \$269,408, set Oct. 4, 1942.

Popular caliber ammunition was reported scarce yesterday as a record aggregation of sportsmen of this area planned to participate in the 1947 deer hunting season opening today.

The increase, as reported by local sportsmen, is due largely to the fact that the season this year has been decreased to 20 days the usual 30-day period. Officially opening today, the season will close Monday, Oct. 20.

Deer in the state have been on the increase for the last few years, game officials report, and only the shortage of ammunition and guns makes the outlook for an excellent season clouded.

A complete official synopsis of hunting regulations may be obtained at any of the local hardware or sporting goods stores in

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a pamphlet printed by the Oregon State Game Commission. The following four-fold appeal to sportsmen has again been made this year by the State Game Commission:

1. Protect fish and game by preventing forest fires.
2. Leave a clean camp and a clean record.
3. Respect rights of landowners.
4. Help to enforce the game laws.
