Tomorrow's election will determine the fate of the proposed state sales tax. Wonder how many persons will take advantage of their democratic rights, which they discuss so freely, and go to the polls.

ELECTION DATE WRONG

The Oregon State Legislature made a number of mistakes in connection with the sales tax proposal upon which voters will ballot at a special election Tuesday. If the legislature really favored passage of the sales tax law, its biggest error was the date set for the election.

We predict a lot of people who vote against the sales tax will wish they had voted in the affirmative after they receive their property tax statements in November. And, the tax statements soon forthcoming will be quite tame in comparison to those which property owners may get at some future date if a defeat of the sales tax is combined with a depression or recession reducing income tax surpluses.

As long as high wages and profits continue to keep income tax revenue above normal, we probably can maintain our state government on the black side of the ledger. But a sudden drop in income, as could happen in case of recession, would weak dire havoc with the state's financial program.

The sales tax, serving to split major tax sources into three divisions, would act as a balancer in case income tax revenues should take a sudden drop. We now carry our tax eggs in two baskets—income and property taxes. The sales tax would provide added safety.

Inasmuch as the proposed Oregon sales tax law does not tax food not consumed on the premises, thus exempting food purchased for consumption at home (you pay tax on meals eaten in a restaurant, but not on a lunch packed by the restaurant and taken out to be eaten elsewhere) while no tax is imposed on rents, we cannot take too seriously the claims of opponents that the law taxes the "necessity to spend."

But while principal interest in Tuesday's election centers in the sales tax, we should not overlook the fact that the ballot also offers a proposal to place a tax of one-tenth of one cent on each cigarette to be sold in Oregon. The cigarette tax is proposed as a means of staving off a deficit next year should the sales tax fail.

It will be interesting to see whether Oregon voters are consistent. It would seem rather inconsistent if they voted down a general sales tax, then voted a sales tax on one particular item.

Personally, we can't see why one particular item should be singled out for taxation. If cigarettes are to be taxed, then, at least, why not other tobacco forms? Why pick on the cigarette smoker?

We doubt if the proposed cigarette tax would produce the amount of revenue claimed for it. A sufficient number of cigarette smokers would switch to pipes, cigars, or from "tailor-mades" to hand-rolled, that tax revenue would be far less than the estimate based on present consumption.
