Huge Sum Spent To Grade Lumber

The two lumber grading bureaus serving the Douglas fir region of Oregon and Washington are spending more than \$2,500,000 annually to ensure accurate grading of lumber from this area, according to a joint announcement made by bureau executives today.

It was also disclosed that mills producing 90 per cent of the region's lumber are members of

these grading organizations—a record high for the industry—while grading inspection service is available for the remaining 10 per cent.

The two organizations serving the area on an independent basis are the West Coast Bureau of Lumber Grades and Inspection and the Pacific Lumber Inspection Bureau. Together they employ 694 supervisors and inspectors, and have a combined payroll of more than \$2,500,000.

Lumber is graded according to its suitability for the number-jeas uses for which it is designed. Virtually all lumber buying and selling is done on the basis of grades.

"Grades which identify Pacific Northwest lumber are recognized throughout the nation and around the world," said the statement released by the two bureaus.

"They are the foundation upon which the lumber commerce of this region rests. It is significant that the Douglas fir industry is spending more than two million dollars a year to insure the reliability and acceptance of its product. Accurate and dependable grading of lumber is becoming more and more important in all fields of construction."

The volume of lumber now receiving grading supervision in the Douglas fir region, the statement said, has increased more than 25 per cent since pre-war years. Supervisors are mainly employed in California, the Middle West and in the East to guarantee maintenance of manufacturing standards from producer to consumer.
