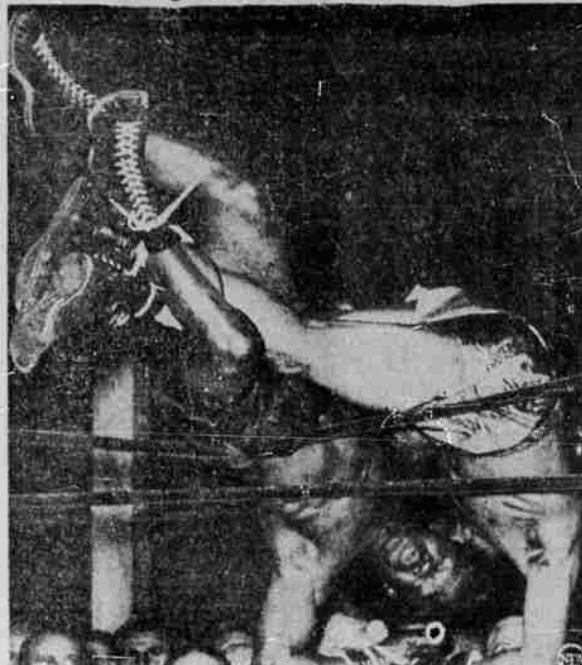

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Contracts on Roseburg Road Job Be Let Oct. 21

Bids for the widening of E. 2nd Ave. S. are scheduled to be opened in Portland Oct. 21 by the State Highway Department. It was reported today by K. D. Lytle, resident engineer for the highway department here.

Plans call for paving of 4.39 miles from the intersection of E. 2nd Ave. S. and N. Jackson St. to the county scale house at the Dixonville junction, to join with an eight-mile section of the North Umpqua Road recently completed.

Within the city, the road will have a 60-foot width with curbs and a sidewalk on the south side. Outside the city, the road will have a 34-foot base and a 20-foot asphalt pavement. The widening, both within the city and outside, will be contracted as one project.

VETERAN DIES

Bolton Winston Meadows, 44, veteran of World War I, died at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital Tuesday. Mr. Meadows was born at LaGrande, Ore., March 5, 1903. He was admitted to the hospital from Medford and was a mechanic in civilian life.

Increase in Price of Fuel Oil Is Announced

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8.—(AP)—An increase of five cents a barrel in the price of Standard fuel oil and Standard light fuel oil for all types of delivery in all points of Washington and Oregon, and Eureka, Calif., was announced today by Standard of California.

The boost is designed, the announcement said, "to recover the actual cost of transportation from the refineries to the distribution terminals."

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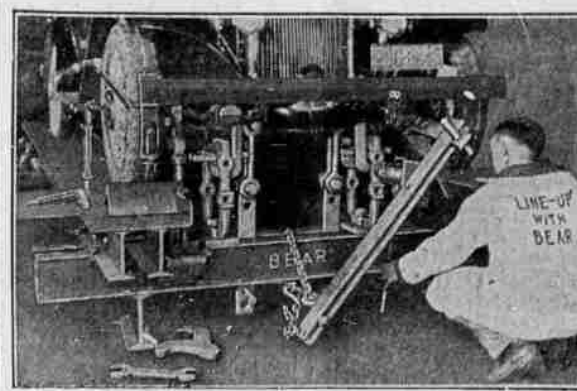
