B.P.W.C. MEMBERS ATTEND MEETING

At a state meeting of Oregon's Business and Professional Women's Club in Eugene, Sunday, October 5, Mrs. Nancy Anderson, British club organizer, told 286 members in graphic terms that England may be down, but she isn't out. Seventeen Roseburg members traveled by car caravan to the luncheon meeting at the Osburn Hotel which marked the opening of National Business and Professional Women's Week.

Mrs. Anderson presented dramatically and fluently a picture of Britain in war and peace.

"There was not a home in Britain," said Mrs. Anderson, "that did not know an American parcel during the dark days of the war." She expressed her gratitude to her listeners and requested that they in turn convey her thanks to their relatives and friends.

After emphasizing that there is no black market in England, she painted a word picture of rationing. British children were never better, according to the medical records, in spite of rationing which allows adults thirty points monthly. British housewives must make careful use of all rations to provide their families with adequate food and clothing. One egg per week is the allowance during the summer; one egg per month

in winter. Wages in England, said the visitor, are reasonable, but the need for export has caused a shortage in consumer goods and a lowering of the standard of living. In defense of Britain's latest tariffs against American articles Mrs. Anderson declared that a choice had to be made between films and tobacco, or food and machinery which are desperately needed.

Turning to the future and the hope for peace Mrs. Anderson in crisp British accent said:

"The hope for the future lies in well-informed public opinion. Business and Professional Women's Clubs throughout the world contribute to government and peace by the discussion of problems and the resolving of ideas."

"Human fights," she continued, "will automatically take care of men's and women's rights." With the statement that among the displaced persons of Europe there are 15,000 under age, she turned to America.

She honored America as the eighth wonder of the world, and said that she had never dreamed of anything as beautiful as Oregon.

Cooler Weather Reported Moving Into Eastern Area

(By the Associated Press) Temperatures dropped to near normal, breaking a spell of unseasonably warm weather, over the north central region and much of the Great Lakes area today as midsummer temperatures prevailed in some parts of the East and the New England states.

Cool air from Central Canada extended across the northern tier of states to Illinois and moved slowly southeastward to the Ohio Valley. Coolest spot in the area was in Northern Minnesota, with below freezing reported at Bemidji. A sharp drop was reported in Chicago, from yesterday's high of 88 to 54 early today, and with a predicted high of 62 today.

The mercury climbed to a warm 87 in Portland, Me., yesterday; was 83 in Boston; 81 in Philadelphia and 78 in New York. General rains have occurred in the southeastern states, principally in Virginia, the Carolinas, Georgia and Mississippi. Showers also were reported over the Western states.
