Couple Arrested On Narcotics Charge

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 14.—(AP)—The arrest of William Patrick Santore, 35, and his wife, Inez, about 33, in what federal narcotics agents said was "an important case" in this region was announced today.

Federal agents said Santore, who in 1938 was sentenced to four years' imprisonment on a charge of selling marijuana, is accused of wholesaling the drug and raising some of it within 50 feet of the U. S. postoffice at Baker, Ore.

Santore and his wife were arrested Saturday in Baker, where they first went after moving from Portland two years ago. They were bound over to the Federal Grand Jury on \$2,500 bond each by U. S. Commissioner B. Duval Isaminger in Pendleton Saturday.

The pair was to be brought here from Pendleton today. Federal agents said the case involved "the major source of supply of marijuana in the Portland area."

Strike Against Express Co. In New York Comes to End

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Some 4,000 AFL teamsters returned to their jobs today, ending a crippling 26-day strike against the Railway Express Agency which had tied up the company's air and rail shipments throughout the metropolitan area.

After agreeing to submit their differences to an emergency mediation board to be named by President Truman, the striking employees, members of two locals of the AFL brotherhood of teamsters, went back to work last night in terminals in New York, Jersey City, Hoboken and Weehawken, N. J.

PORTLAND, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Cash pay-off punchboards disappeared from store counters here today as city police intensified a campaign against them.

Three persons were arrested yesterday in morning raids. Police Chief L. V. Jenkins said the action by plainclothes officers was the result of the state attorney general's ruling that cash boards are illegal. Merchandise boards are not being confiscated, he said.

Trojan Halfback Naumu Is Lost for Season

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 14.—(AP)—The USC Trojans, 32-0 victors over Ohio State, were scheduled to return to a rousing welcome today and start work for their coast conference clash Saturday with Oregon State. Coach Jeff Cravath installed Don Narlin at left half in place of Hawaiian Johnny Naumu, lost for the season with a broken arm suffered in the Buckeye game.

HUGE FLAG RAISED

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The largest American flag ever flown—weighing 500 pounds—was raised today on the New Jersey tower of the George Washington bridge over the Hudson river.

It took 19 men using four machine winches to haul up the 60 by 50 foot flag on guy ropes weighing 5,000 pounds. Raised in celebration of Columbus Day, the flag will be flown each holiday when wind velocity permits, the port of New York authority announced.

BAIL FORFEITED

Failing to appear in Municipal Court yesterday to answer a charge of drunkenness and disorderly conduct, Earl Vodo, Roseburg, forfeited \$30 bail which he had posted Saturday. Chief of Police O. A. Kennerly said E. V. Gilland, Roseburg, was sentenced to 10 days in the city jail on a vagrancy charge. The sentence was suspended by Municipal Judge Ira B. Riddle on Oct. 13; he "leave the city."

Better Promotion of Winter Sports Urged

PORTLAND, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Oregon needs more promotion behind its winter resort enterprises, Charles T. Carey of the Union Pacific Railroad told a

chamber of commerce group here.

Carey, who helped establish obscure Sun Valley, Idaho, to international fame, said the state was losing millions of dollars in tourist business each winter by failure to advertise the state's

winter recreation facilities.

But he warned that facilities must be deluxe. "You people out here like to rough it, but the tourists don't. They are not amused by sleeping bags, oil lamps and outside facilities," he said.

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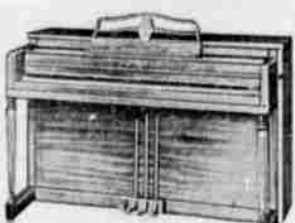
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
