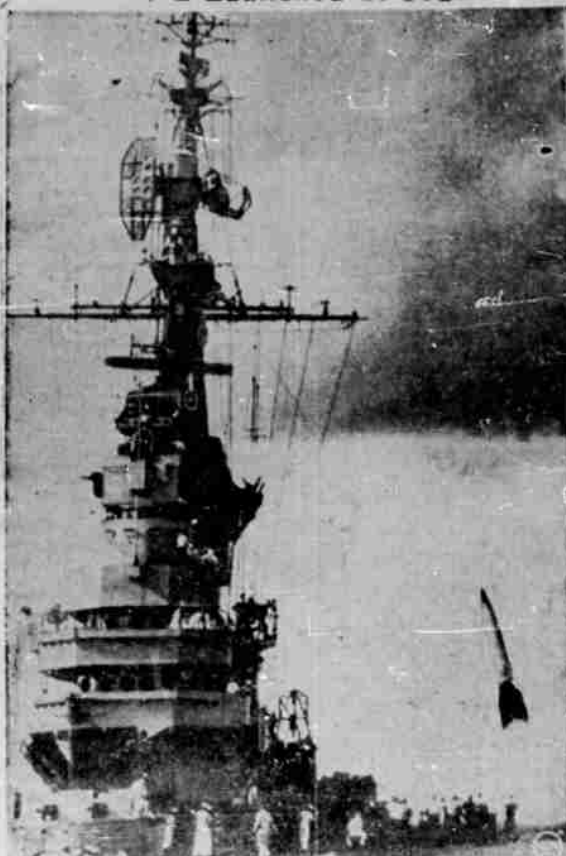

Republicans Balk At Pledging U.S. Aid to Europe

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Any offer by President Truman to pass up a special session of Congress would be welcomed, Senate Republicans said today, but some balked at pledging early January action on emergency aid to Europe in exchange.

This reaction was prompted by word from a Capitol Hill associate that Mr. Truman wants to avoid calling Congress back in December if he can obtain assurances from the Republican majority that a program of stop gap help will be pushed to a decision soon after the first of the year. The regular sessions opens January 2.

At the president's request, key committees of Congress will meet next month to study a proposal that western European countries be granted \$380,000,000 to carry them until March 1 while Congress debates the Marshall plan for long range rehabilitation of Europe.

One of these committees is the Senate appropriations group. Senator Wherry (R.-Neb.), a member, told a reporter:

"On the basis of the information we now have, I see no reason for a special session and I would be glad to abandon any plans for a special session. As for speed in January, Ferguson said:

"I am sure there will be no inclination to stall, but no member or even a committee of Congress can express any assurance of fast action. The question is, how soon can we get the facts? It's up to the administration to provide them and for that reason it's up to the administration as to how quickly Congress acts."

Senator Brewster (R.-Me.) said he thought a decision to forego a special session would "produce good results," adding that any attempt to push a program through during the holiday season "would be a vain one."

Services for Harold K. Hand to Be Held Saturday

Funeral services for Harold Kenneth Hand, 32, of Roseburg, who died in Seattle Monday, will be held in the chapel of the Long & Orr Mortuary Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Rev. Delos Crook will have charge of the services. Vault interment will follow in the Masonic Cemetery.

Mr. Hand was born in Newton, Kas., Feb. 19, 1917. He served as a sergeant in the ordnance department of the U. S. Army for 39 months during the recent war, and was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas D. Hand, 532 S. Pine St., Roseburg. Survivors besides the parents are one brother, Wallace M. Hand, of Seattle.

Little Evidence Locally of Food Saving Cooperation

While the majority of queried shoppers reported to be in favor of President Truman's food conservation program, there was little evidence this week that housewives and restaurant patrons were departing from their regular meal routines.

Meat markets reported that Tuesday's sales were unchanged in volume although most stated

they would not handle poultry today.

Only a limited number of restaurants dropped steaks and other meats from their Tuesday menus, stating that they were leaving the decision of what to eat up to the customers. Many queried stated that ham and eggs would remain on the menu on Thursday until sales dropped.

Submarine Peak New Discovery

SEATTLE, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Discovery of a submarine peak towering 11,500 feet above the ocean floor, 800 miles west of here, was reported here by Capt. Robert A. Studds of the Coast and Geodetic survey.

He said it takes rank as the tallest known under-water peak in the North Pacific, exceeding by 200 feet the Gulf of Alaska's Mt. Miller.

Captain Studds said the mountain, rising within 2,700 feet of the ocean's surface, was recorded last week by his ship, the Pathfinder, while returning from a five-month survey of Bristol Bay, north of the Aleutians.

"It is very possible that we only passed over a shoulder of the mountain," he said, "missing

its crest, but we are certain of its existence and the fact that it rises quite abruptly from the ocean floor." He said the Pathfinder was running a bottom survey line, when it ran across the peak, and could not deviate from its course for additional exploratory soundings.

He expressed the belief the finding would be of interest both to navigators and seismologists, and that if a higher prominence should be found on it, rising to within 1,800 feet of the surface, it might afford possibility for a new fishing ground.

FARM INCOME HIGH

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—(AP)—The agriculture department today estimated gross farm income this year will be \$4,300,000,000, the highest of record and 18 per cent above 1946.

Net income, after paying production expenses, was figured at \$1,800,000,000.
