## INTERNAL PURPOSES.

THAT is to say, he thinks, Rus-  
sia's Communist rulers are  
TALKING TO THE RUSSIANS  
and not to us.

That, if true, would be highly  
significant. When you go home  
and cuss somebody out bitterly to  
your own family, it's APT to be  
somebody you're AFRAID OF.

If you were as mad as your  
cussing indicated, and weren't  
afraid of him, you'd probably  
hunt him up and knock his block  
off.

If you were big enough.

THAT raises another interesting  
question: "If Russia is afraid of  
us, WHY?"

If you could see with your own  
eyes the way the common run of  
Russians live in comparison with  
the way WE live, if you could  
measure for yourself the scanty  
comforts and satisfactions yielded  
to them by their way of life and  
compare it with the vastly greater  
comforts and satisfactions yielded  
to us by our way of life, the situa-  
tion might be plainer.

It would then occur to you that  
the LESS the general run of Rus-  
sians undergo, know about the  
happiness and the plenty that are  
the rule in free enterprise Amer-  
ica the better it will be for the  
Communist big shots in the Krem-  
lin.

IN other words, they may be  
using all this cussing in the  
way that we use a mustard  
plaster. The heat and pain of the  
plaster take our minds off the  
pain of the sore muscles.

WE learn from the dispatches  
that Britain's crown jewels  
are now safely back in the Tower  
of London after being kept in  
hiding since the early days of the  
war.

That raises another question in  
these parlous days:

If you were as bad off as the  
British profess to be, could you  
afford to keep so much of your  
capital tied up in things like  
crown jewels?

Wouldn't it be better (if you  
were in Britain's fix) to sell 'em,  
or at least hock 'em, and use the  
money to buy say MACHINERY  
TO MINE COAL MORE EFFEC-  
TIVELY?

FROM Los Angeles comes word  
that the high cost of living is  
playing hob with the gals. For  
one thing, it's causing them to  
put off getting married. For an-  
other, mere cakes and coffee are  
costing so much that there isn't  
enough left for beauty treatments  
in the modern manner.

(A survey just completed in  
L. A. indicates that about a tenth  
of the young women surveyed are

Anyway, it brings home to us  
the fundamental fact, which we  
too seldom realize, that an infla-

nickel per rat tail, which was then  
the going price to farm young-  
sters, never got rich at the job.

goes slowly.

High School Grid  
Race Narrowing

Oregon prep elevens poised to  
day for a weekend of play that  
will add a few important strokes  
to the already clearing district  
title picture.

A Medford-Klamath Falls bat-  
tle in District 2 and a Wash-  
ton-Commerce fray in District 3  
rank on the crucial list, while,  
elsewhere in the state, the top  
contenders for district pennants  
face easier contests.

The Dalles, which practically  
has the District 1 title in pocket  
now, is banking on a sixth  
straight victory at Falls-Med-  
ford affair should—barring a tie—  
eliminate one of the three south-  
ern Oregon District 2 contenders.  
The third is Bend, the big six lea-  
der which meets Klamath and  
Medford later on and whose only  
loss this season was to out-of-  
district Dalles.

Indian Game Vital

Roseburg has a chance to set  
up Myrtle Point as the District 3  
tillist, Myrtle Point, though it  
managed only a 6-6 tie with  
Marshfield last week, is leading  
the section by virtue of Marsh-  
field's loss to Medford, and a  
Roseburg upset of Marshfield  
would clinch the lead. The Myr-  
tle Pointers themselves draw an  
easy one: Reedport.

The pennant pictures in Dis-  
tricts 4 and 5—big districts full  
of teams that never play each  
other—are out of focus, as usual.  
Corvallis, which appears the  
strongest in District 4, is favored  
over Eugene today. University  
High, unbeaten in the district  
but opposed by weaker squads,  
takes the weekend off. Spring-  
field, whose win-loss record  
matches that of Corvallis but  
whose one loss was to Corvallis,  
takes on Salem; and Cottage  
Grove, in a similar status with  
U. High, meets Elmira.

Titie At Stake  
Milwaukie must down Hood  
River today to keep ahead in the  
race for the District 1 title. Wood-  
burn, Molalla, and Dallas, whose  
records match or beat Milwau-  
kie's but who are almost too  
small for title contention, are all  
favored to keep their Williamette  
Valley league records perfect.  
Molalla meets Silverton; Dallas,  
Canby; and Woodburn, Mt. An-  
n.

In District 6, whose boundaries  
coincide neatly with the Tualuma-  
Yamhill Valley league, McMinn-  
ville will try to salvage its 1946  
championship in a tilt with Bea-  
verton. Newberg will meet Forest  
Grove, undefeated in league play,  
and Hillsboro, the other strong  
contender, is favored over Tillam-  
ook.

St. Helens, way out in front  
in District 7, meets a Seaside  
team that has yet to win a game  
this year. In Portland, the pow-  
erful Washington Colonials, fa-  
vored by many for the city pen-  
nant, line up against their stiff-  
est battle so far, Commerce. Jef-  
ferson, also unbeaten in Port-  
land play, should stay that way  
after its tilt with weak Rosevill.

Elk Season to Open in  
Douglas County Oct. 25  
Elk sason in Douglas and Coos  
counties begins Oct. 25 through  
Nov. 2, inclusive, according to  
the official synopsis of 1947 hunt-  
ing laws. Hunters of this area  
can count on the season for bull  
elk having antlers with three  
points or more.

The open area for Douglas and  
Coos counties includes: Begin at  
junction of Umpqua river high-  
way No. 38 with U. S. highway  
101 at Reedport, thence east  
along highway 38 to junction  
with U. S. 99 at Drayton, thence  
south along highway 99 to Crook  
Junction at highway No. 52,  
thence west along highway No.  
42 to Coquille, thence north to  
place of beginning.
