At the Indian camp last night, Coach "Coco" Sherwood told his squad he was greatly satisfied with their showing at Marshfield Friday, even though they came out on the short end of the 12-0 score. Line play was exceptionally good, he said, and added that he had no regrets for the loss, as the Indians showed up fundamentally better and completely out-charged the Pirates, who out-manned Roseburg in age, weight and experience.

Special praise was given by Sherwood to Lloyd Mayhorne, rugged tackle, who was tagged by pressbox men as Marshfield's fifth backfield man with his frequent tackles from the rear; Dick Bonebrake, fleet-footed fullback, and Bob Sanders, quarterback. Sherwood stated that in his belief, the difference in the victory was Marshfield's flashy back, Runge, who turned in the victor's scores.

"so that if the proposal failed to pass, there would be time to submit a proposal for an area with less extensive boundaries. The boundaries proposed by the commission follow natural lines of drainage, Irving said. Councilman Percy Croft brought up the problem of sewage disposal in areas where pumping might be necessary to carry sewage to the present or to future disposal plants. He suggested smaller boundaries for annexation. Irving stated that such sewage problems would be a matter for engineering.

The city attorney asked Todd to arrange for polling places and election judges and clerks in the outlying areas before the next council meeting.

Building Code Discussed
City Manager M. W. Slankard

recommended to the council the adoption of the Uniform Building Code and placement of building, plumbing and electrical inspection services under one individual, whose salary would be paid by inspection fees.

The council discussed the proposed code in relation to problems brought about by the remodeling of the Miller Mercantile Co. Under the present city building code, the store is required to build a fireproof exterior wall above its street-level show windows. Representatives of the company have contended that a wood-and-stucco front would be permissible under the Uniform Building Code. The matter is still pending.

No Sewer Bids
No bids were submitted for the sewer project in the northeast corner of the city in E. 7th St., Ave. "A" and "B," and E. 3rd Ave. N. Specifications will be modified to permit the use of either vitrified clay or concrete sewer pipes and the project re-advertised.

The city manager was directed by the council to use his own discretion in granting permission to the Roseburg High School senior class to post signs advertising the senior play to be staged in the Roseburg Armory.

Purchase of a money counting machine to be paid for out of parking meter revenues was authorized by the council. Slankard said that the city is presently paying the U. S. National Bank \$15 a month to count the money collected from parking meters. The counting machine will cost \$180 and will be paid for on the same basis as the parking meters.

three successive sessions, a process which takes two years. Informed sources said the new bill might limit this delay to six months.

Since their rise to power, the Laborite ministers repeatedly warned the peers they would brook no interference from the non-elected upper chamber.

Dates From 1066
The feudal aristocracy from which the House of Lords sprang was created by William the Conqueror immediately after his conquest of Britain in 1066. He parceled out land and attached the strict condition that the holders of title and land owed him military service. William and his successors took counsel with the bishops, abbots, barons, earls and knights rather than with a national common council which had advised the Anglo-Saxon rulers.

The membership of the House of Lords at the beginning of this year included three peers of royal blood, two archbishops, 20 dukes, 27 marquesses, 130 earls, 99 viscounts, 24 bishops and 513 barons.

The House of Lords in modern times seldom has met for more than three hours in any one day. Usually only about 100 peers attend the sessions, and of these

only 60 take active part in the business. Three members can constitute a quorum.

Brazil Cuts Diplomatic Relations With Russia

ative for national honor."

In Moscow yesterday, Pravda, anticipating the break, said that talk of the severance of relations showed "reactionaries" had "lost all balance."

Some diplomats were inclined to interpret Brazil's action as a turning point in Latin American relations with Russia and Communism. They foresaw repercussions at the Inter-American Conference in January, scheduled to discuss the United States proposal for standardization of arms in this hemisphere.

The foreign office statement said the U. S. embassy in Moscow had assumed charge of

Brazil's interests in the Soviet Union.

Well informed diplomatic sources here said the Yugoslav legation probably would handle Russian affairs in Brazil.

The note addressed to the Russian government announcing the

break in relations said that Brazil had acted because of an "extreme outrageous and calumnious article" against President Dutra and the Brazilian armed forces which appeared in the Moscow Literary Gazette.

Soviet press was controlled by the Russian government and that the government must be held responsible for what appeared in the press. The Russian government, the note added, had refused to accept a Brazilian protest against the Gazette article.
