BONDS FOR SCHOOLS

Persons attending the Chamber of Commerce forum luncheon program Monday heard School Board Chairman "Bud" Ellison tell of problems facing the Roseburg school district in connection with expansion of facilities to accommodate rapidly increasing enrollment. The board of directors, he said, is seeking solutions to the problem and welcomes any suggestions.

School directors are worried. Board members, principals of the various schools and the city school superintendent are contacted almost daily by individual parents, groups of parents, and organized delegations protesting conditions within the school system.

Classrooms are critically overcrowded. Students are meeting in improvised rooms in basements, occupying quarters previously used as storerooms and fuel rooms. In one room in the Senior High School building, it was stated, the teacher stands within inches of a drop into the furnace room pit. Prefabricated annexes have been erected at the several buildings to handle overflow classes. These structures are far from being perfect for the purposes for which they are used. In one case, tiny children must go up and down steps, exposed to rain and wind when the weather is inclement.

Daily attendance, it was pointed out, has doubled from 1,170 in 1942 to 2,241 in 1947. As the 1947 figure was based on September averages, the rate is still higher counting present attendance. Yet, despite this rapid growth, there has been no increase in buildings, except the temporary shelters erected or in process of erection. Classrooms have been provided by dividing stages, auditoriums, basements, gymnasiums, etc., until the limit has been reached. An eight-room school building is under construction at Edenbower. It had been expected this new building would take off the pressure for a few years. Instead, it will be full by spring, according to present indications.

In the Senior High School, teachers this year voluntarily agree to a six-period working day instead of the customary five-period day. They receive no compensation for the extra work. Classes could not be forced into classrooms to permit a five-period schedule, the district had no money to hire more teachers, and no classroom space was available had it been possible to employ the needed extra teachers. Faced with this dilemma, teachers voluntarily assumed the added duty without charge to the district. It is an action that should be brought to the attention of patrons for their appreciation, which is all the compensation the teachers will receive.

The board of directors tentatively propose a plan they believe would solve needs for the next few years. They would build an addition to the Senior High and Fullerton School buildings. The high school addition would be large enough to accommodate the ninth grade, now housed at Junior High School. Sixth grade students would then be moved from some of the elementary schools into the Junior High building, thus making room for enlargement of the lower classes in the respective grade schools. The addition to Fullerton School is necessary to care for the rapidly growing West Roseburg population.

These two additions, it is estimated, would cost approximately \$600,000. The board would like to secure approval for an \$800,000 bond issue. Only enough bonds would be sold to meet the immediate expansion program, but with an additional \$200,000 in reserve, if needed, the district would have a cushion to soften the impact of continued growth should such growth overextend facilities as it has the Edenbower School.

It is pointed out that taxpayers now are paying a six-mill special tax for building purposes. This fund has paid in cash for the Edenbower School. The district will have no indebtedness on that structure. Present bonded debt amounts to approximately \$32,000. District valuation, which jumped from \$6,870,000 in 1947 to \$8,258,000 on the 1948 rolls, is expected to leap to \$10,000,000 in 1949. If a 20-year bond issue were substituted for the special five-year levy the cost would be between four and five mills. It is claimed, instead of the present six mills, but the district would be obligated to debt retirement for a period of 20 years.

On the other hand, additional facilities are needed immediately. They cannot be furnished on a pay-as-you-go program such as contemplated when the five-year special levy was authorized. Another point in favor of bonds, according to the proposal, is the current low interest rate, which probably would be no higher than one and one-half or two per cent, as compared with six per cent bonds now outstanding, and which cannot be refunded because they have no redemption clause to permit payment ahead of the due date.

This bond proposal has not yet been brought to final stage. The board would like to avoid a bond issue, if possible, but at present can see no alternative. Any suggestions, the directors state, would be welcome.

The issue, however, probably will be more definitely formulated in the near future and doubtless will be brought to a vote at a not too distant date. Consequently it would be well for people within the district to start considering the proposal, discuss it in group meetings, seek such information as might be needed for a decision—getting information first-hand from the school board instead of accepting rumor and hearsay—and give the directors the benefit of any suggestions which might appear to be helpful.

The responsibility rests upon the general public equally with the board of directors, which, after all, is elected only to represent the people of the district in supervising school management and operation.

Observance of this country's 172nd Navy Day will take place Sunday, Oct. 26, by Roseburg's Naval Reserve unit with open house ceremonies at its newly constructed armory at the fairgrounds.

Following formal laying of the armory's floor at 9 A.M., Commander Walter Mallory and Ensign David Hill will present brief histories of the unit's history since

activation last summer and a reception will be given for all men and their families of the unit.

The public is cordially invited to attend the ceremonies and inspect the newly procured equipment, which will be on display.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held on the 20th day of October, 1947, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED, that the Common Council of the City of Roseburg deems it expedient and proposes to improve that certain alley in Block 37, Railroad Addition to the City of Roseburg, Oregon, from the north-south line of Mosely Street to the south-south line of Lane Street in the City of Roseburg, in the following manner:

First: By grading said alley to the proper subgrade.

Second: By paving the roadway of said alley the full width of seven feet, eight inches (7' 8") with concrete pavement.

Third: By constructing concrete curb on the integral type.

Fourth: By constructing sub-drainage.

Fifth: By constructing street improvements when necessary.

Said improvements be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer filed in the office of the City Engineer on the 20th day of October, 1947, which said grade, plans, specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.

The entire cost of said improvement shall be paid by the property owners specially benefited by said improvement as provided by the charter of the City of Roseburg, and no part thereof shall be paid by the City of Roseburg.

The estimate of the City Engineer of the probable detail cost of said improvement is the sum of Four Thousand Three Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$4,350.00).

RESOLVED, that the City Recorder of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and hereby is directed to give notice of said proposed improvement as provided by the charter of said city.
