Vishinsky Labels
Byrnes, Forrestal
As 'War Mongers'

LAKE SUCCESS, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Russia's Andrei Vishinsky yesterday added two Truman cabinet members to his list of "war mongers" and declared the new book by ex-Secretary of State James F. Byrnes was a "call for war" against Russia.

The two cabinet members attacked by the Soviet chief delegate to the United Nations assembly are Secretary of Defense James Forrestal and Secretary of Commerce W. Averell Harriman. The Russian also listed William C. Bullitt, former ambassador to Paris and Moscow, as an "inciter to war."

Vishinsky was especially bitter in his attack on Byrnes' book, "Speaking Frankly," which was published last week.

Speaking before the 57-nation political committee of the assembly, Vishinsky declared "Byrnes is trying to break the record in producing slanderous fabrications against the Soviet Union."

Vishinsky described Byrnes' writings as "junk" and said his book probably was "inspired under the shadows of Hollywood, where, it is said, he is now serving in some vague capacity of legal adviser, or an art adviser or a critic."

"Suffering from lust for fame, gone from his hands while he was participating in the foreign policy arena," Vishinsky said, "Byrnes incites the U.S. government to try to get from the Soviet Union, with the help of the United Nations, a consent to withdraw the occupation forces from the eastern zone of Germany, while threatening the Soviet Union with war."

Vishinsky then asked: "Is it possible to consider Byrnes' statement otherwise than a 'recipe for war' against the U.S.S.R.?"

"Certainly not," he went on, "Certainly it is a call to war." Vishinsky made his 8,500-word speech as the political committee opened debate on a Soviet proposal that the assembly act to curb alleged "war mongering" in the United States, Turkey and Greece.

During the war Nimmeler served with the French Army in Africa, after which he was with the army of occupation in France. Identification of the tall blond 24-year-old nephew, whom Mrs. Bendele had never seen, was made in Portland by photographs. He will make his home in Reedsport with his aunt and will be associated in the operation of the Bendele Market.

ANNEXATION BOUNDARIES

An election to determine annexation of suburban territory to the City of Roseburg will be called in the near future, according to present plans. Preliminary work has been completed and only technical procedure remains prior to expression of public opinion through a special election.

Rather than a vote by districts, the election will be on a proposal to include as a unit all abutting territory outlined by the City Planning Commission. This territory, if annexed, would multiply the city's area approximately eight times, although it would add less than \$3 million to assessed valuation.

The plan to be submitted to a vote embraces territory the Planning Commission believes SHOULD be included. If the election results in an unfavorable opinion, it is anticipated that an amended plan will be offered at a second election and that votes then will be taken by districts.

The Planning Commission, we believe, has done its work well. It has studied the territory from the standpoint of anticipated future growth and has endeavored to include all areas which, within the next five or 10 years, should be city territory if health and safety are to be protected.

As the problem of sewage disposal is paramount in the annexation issue, the Planning Commission followed lines of natural drainage in setting up the limits proposed for the enlarged city. Boundaries of School District No. 4 were used as a starting point. The Commission, by process of elimination, removed from its chart those areas, particularly forest and pasture lands which have little prospect of being developed for residential or industrial use, and those areas which, because of topography, could not be brought into an over-all sewage and drainage system. The area proposed for annexation includes approximately two-thirds of the land within the school district.

Roughly, the sections proposed for annexation include West Roseburg, as far west as the Sylmon Valley school house; Riverside, Calkins Road Settlement, Edenbower, north to the highway scales; Deer Creek to the junction of the Deer Creek road and North Umpqua highway, Miller's Addition, Sundale Village and Umpqua Park, south to Metzger gravel plant. This is a big area. Much of it is unimproved property.

But let's look to the future:

The territory proposed for annexation has a population now estimated at about 12,500 to 14,000. The California Oregon Power Company, Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, California-Pacific Utilities Co., banks, chain stores, and other corporations and concerns, required to study prospects for future growth, anticipate Roseburg's population will reach 25,000 to 30,000 within 10 years, given favorable conditions. The various utilities are making their installations on estimates furnished by their engineering staffs predicting future needs of the Roseburg area.

If these estimates prove accurate, and our personal opinion is that they are on the conservative side, it means that the property proposed for annexation will double in population within the next 10 years. If we limit annexation only to those sections in immediate need of inclusion, we will be faced, almost immediately, with unsanitary conditions, fire hazards, unprotected populations in the new "fringe" areas. Within two or three years we will have another annexation problem.

It is obvious that the annexation proposal now includes sections having no immediate need for municipal services. But what will be the condition two years from now? Should the property owner in the outer perimeter wait for annexation until unsanitary conditions threaten his family with typhoid fever, dysentery, infantile paralysis and other epidemic diseases resulting from overcrowded population and lack of sanitation, or should he envision the future and accept inclusion before such hazardous conditions arise?

We realize many people will greet these predictions of Roseburg's growth with skepticism. They believe maximum growth has now been reached. Others prefer to meet emergencies if and when they arise and do not propose to anticipate them. Others are willing to tolerate almost any conditions and risk the dangers and thus avoid higher taxation. Some will feel that the proposed boundary lines are entirely too ambitious.

Thank goodness, everyone is entitled to his own opinion and his own right of franchise. But, personally, we believe we should look to the future. Annexation will bring about a good many headaches. Services will be spread much thinner than at present. Annexed territory will not receive improvements as rapidly as desired. Taxes will be increased in the areas accepted for annexation. But we believe if the job is to be done, it should be done right the first time and not on a piecemeal basis.

Robbery-Killing of
3 Men Admitted by
Disgraced Soldier

PIKEVILLE, Ky., Oct. 23.—(AP)—Paul John Schneider, 24-year-old dishonorably discharged soldier formerly of San Francisco, admitted to police yesterday, the robbery-killing of three filling station attendants—one in Denver and two in the Detroit area—between September 21 and October 3, chief deputy sheriff Robert R. Leake reported.

Schneider, who headed a lengthy investigation in which two FBI agents and Kentucky and Michigan state police participated, said Schneider confessed:

1. Robbing and shooting a filling station attendant held up in Denver Sept. 21 and then proceeding to Detroit.

2. Holding up a second filling station attendant in suburban Detroit, beating him to death with a tire tool.

3. Holding up and robbing a third attendant near Detroit two hours later and killing him.

Although Schneider did not identify any of the men slain by name, Doak said it was virtually certain the Denver man was Frank J. Ford, 46, who had been missing since the September date.

In the early investigation, Moore said Schneider admitted:

1. Robbing two filling stations in Los Angeles Sept. 16, and kidnapping H. V. Quint, attendant at one of the stations who was later released unharmed.

2. Burglary of the Lonoke Motors Co. at Lonoke, Ark., in which a small amount of cash and auto accessories were stolen.

Doak also said the ownership of a 1946 convertible automobile that Schneider was driving had been traced to Quint.

Salem, Ore., Oct. 23.—(AP)—Paul J. Schneider was sentenced Nov. 15, 1941, to Oregon state training school at Woodburn for breaking and entering, state police said. He escaped three weeks later.

Earlier he had been picked up as a parole violator and another time he was arrested on an Army charge and turned over to military authorities.

He is listed on state police records as having been born at Harrisburg.

New Tower Will Rise
On Lookout Mountain

Timbers for the construction of a new observation tower on Lookout Mountain, on the Little River-North Umpqua divide, are being packed in by mules a distance of 12 miles over narrow trails, said M. M. Nelson, supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest.

A 30-foot tower will replace a ground lookout house on the mountain for better visibility, Nelson said. The lookout house being replaced is one of the earliest types still on the forest.

Built in Sales Plan
