## Russia Aims To Create Economic Chaos in America

Soviet Russia has touched a new high in her aggression against democracy by boldly blazoning to the world a scheme whereby the Communists figure that an economic crisis can be precipitated in the United States—an interesting corollary to the persistent predictions in the Red capital that America is headed for a great depression.

The general idea is that if all European nations now affiliated with the Marshall Plan will gang up with the Soviet bloc, and be steadfast in "opposing American slave loan conditions," Americans will be faced with an economic crisis stemming from lack of foreign demand for their production. Then, so this extraordinary proposal goes, anti-capitalist Russia can cooperate with capitalist European countries indefinitely on the basis of "reciprocity and mutual fulfillment of obligations."

This fresh method of attack on the U.S.A. was detailed in a speech by Andrei Zhdanov—one of Bolshevism's top figures—at the recent conference in Poland among representatives of Russia and her satellite countries of eastern Europe. The conference—with Zhdanov manipulating the strings of the marionette states—set up the so-called nine-nation Communist information bureau which is functioning in Belgrade, Yugoslavia. That's

what they called the committee, but observers generally hold that it has taken over many of the functions of the supposedly abolished Comintern, which long was the general staff for the conduct of Communist world revolution. The conference in Poland was held some weeks ago, but it was only yesterday that Moscow released Zhdanov's speech to the press. It's a highly interesting circumstance that this release comes on top of General Charles de Gaulle's sensational political comeback in the French country-wide municipal elections. De Gaulle, fiercely anti-Communist, achieved his victory by calling on the public to follow him in a crusade to defeat Communism and rehabilitate the economically harassed nation. It strikes me that this threat from De Gaulle likely is what impelled Moscow to make public the Zhdanov effort to consolidate as much of Europe as possible against the "imperialistic camp" of which he declared the United States is "the principal leading force."

Long Known to U. S.  
Well now, what Zhdanov labels as an "imperialistic camp" includes the democracies of Europe plus the entire western hemisphere. And while his plot for a concerted effort to create an economic crisis in the United States is new, it's no news either to the United States or the other democracies that Moscow has been doing its utmost to create chaos within their borders by the employment of Russian agents and with the assistance of fifth columnists and fellow travelers.

The United States authorities are moving energetically to eliminate the Red menace in America.

## Mary Van Kirk's Singing Delights Assn. Audience

More than 1100 members of the Community Concert Association were enthralled with Mary Van Kirk, contralto, last evening, when she presented the first concert of the fifth season of the Association at the Junior High School auditorium, assisted by her very able accompanist, Willard Sekberg.

Miss Van Kirk's concert was probably the most popular ever to be presented in Roseburg, as her program, which included eighteen numbers, many of them being the better-known songs. The noted contralto, famed for her singing with the Metropolitan Opera, as well as for radio programs for Firestone and as guest artist for numerous symphony orchestras, won the hearts of everyone hearing her.

Round after round of applause shook the auditorium at the close of every number. ## Ford Motor Company Reduces Stock, Surplus

BOSTON, Oct. 23.—(AP)—The Ford Motor Company reported its capital stock and surplus decreased \$14,136,000, from \$697,298,000 on Dec. 31, 1945, to \$683,162,000 on Dec. 31, 1946.

The figures were contained in a balance sheet filed with the Tax Commissioner of Massachusetts, only state to require such a report from the Ford Motor Company.

Net working capital, the company reported, decreased in 1946 by \$44,669,000. Total current assets Dec. 31, 1946, were placed at \$569,555,000, compared with \$523,638,000 a year previously, while liabilities increased to \$168,818,000 from \$78,232,000 during the same period.

Included in the current assets, the report stated, were inventories of \$179,817,000, and an increase of \$77,891,000.
