

Poverty's Causes Chief Concern of Security Chief

WASHINGTON—Oscar R. Ewing, new administrator of the Federal Security Agency, is more concerned with seeking out the causes of social evils than spending time and money binding the wounds.

"If you only relieved a fraction of the suffering in getting at the root of it, the result would be a great saving, not to mention the pay-off in human happiness," he says.

In assuming "unbounded enthusiasm" his responsibilities as head of the world's largest social service program, touching the lives of every man, woman, and child in the United States, Mr. Ewing said the agency's work is to:

1. Enrich the life of the individual citizen with better health.
2. "Enlarge his spiritual and emotional life with better education."
3. Provide him with a measure of relief from the apprehensions of a penniless old age and a degree of sustenance when old age or disability actually come upon him."

No Backward Step

He would like to see health insurance for all, an extension of social security to cover farm workers, domestics and the self-employed and a more uniform standard of education in the United States.

He says he'd like to get going on the non-controversial programs, such as medical research, education, hospital construction and community diagnostic clinics, while fighting over the other things.

"We have arrived at the point where we realize that the individual's liberty can be preserved only so far as it is good for society in general that he have it," says Ewing.

"That's the New Deal. Not one single thing that has been done under the New Deal's security program has been repealed and it won't be."

Grants Pass Post First In Civil Defense Plan

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Oct. 22.—(P)—Grants Pass Post, No. 28, American Legion, Monday night became the first post in the United States known to have taken steps to implement the Legion's 1947 national convention dictum that all posts undertake to foster community civil defense units.

Department Commander Jack Maris of Canyonville and Attorney Neil Allen of Grants Pass, national chairman of the Legion's

Civil Defense Committee, were the speakers at the meeting.

County, city and Chamber of Commerce representatives attended. A special Chamber of Commerce committee was appointed by President F. Johnson to further the local program.

New Grazing Plans Receiving Study

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—(P)—Recommendations of a House public lands subcommittee for administration of national forest grazing are being studied by Department of Agriculture officials.

The recommendations were made in the form of a letter to Secretary of Agriculture Anderson, signed by Rep. Barrett (R-Wyo.), chairman of the subcommittee which held extensive hearings throughout the West this fall, and nine other members.

A forest service official said today that two weeks may elapse before a reply is drafted setting forth the Department's position with respect to the subcommittee's proposals.

- These included:
1. A three-year moratorium on reduction in grazing permits.
 2. Establishment of impartial local appeal boards, representing the public, grazing permittees and the forest service, with jurisdiction over grazing and livestock operations in national forests.

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No Food Waste on Farms, Assertion

SALEM, Oct. 22.—(P)—State Agriculture Director E. L. Peterson denied that food is being wasted on farms.

Peterson, whom Governor Snell named as coordinator for the food conservation program in Oregon, also said the President's Citizens Food Committee will make a nationwide broadcast today urging organization of local food conservation committees in every community in the country. The broadcast, to be carried by the Mutual Network, will be at 1:30 P. M. Pacific Standard Time.

Peterson said the "logical approach to the problem of food conservation is to prevent wastage."

There should be no edible food in any garbage pail in our state."

Peterson said farmers are too well trained to waste food, and that he couldn't afford to waste any feed because of high feed costs.

"The task of each of us is to make what we have go as far as it will, to secure the fullest possible utilization of what we have. To the end that our country may contribute its fullest to the relief of human suffering everywhere, I know that the citizens of our state will cooperate fully to prevent food wastage wherever it may occur."

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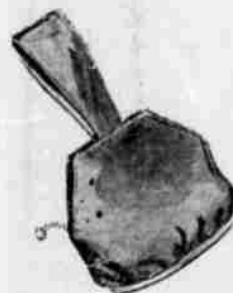
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
