THE job of the boss is to FORESEE AND PREPARE. That is why we have bosses. The President of the United States is the boss of American foreign policy. When he fiddles around too long, instead of sizing the situation up and acting decisively IN TIME, he falls down on his job of being boss.

It is obvious to anyone who does anything resembling connected thinking that we've fiddled around too long about sending the fire wagon to Europe. It will be harder and costlier to put out the fire now that it would have been six months ago.

That fact is plain.

WITH congress not in session, responsibility rests rather clearly upon the shoulders of the administration. With the flames in Europe spreading suddenly like a prairie fire that has just reached dry grass, it is easy to see why the President would like to have somebody else on the job.

PRESIDENT TRUMAN is a likable person. It would probably not be going too far to say that he is a lovable man. If he ran a necktie shop in Roseburg, he would be about the most popular man in town.

But there are grave doubts, based now upon considerable experience, as to whether he is big enough to run the world.

He probably has some doubts about it himself. Hence his desire to get congress back on the job. When things begin to go bad, nothing is more natural or more human than the desire to call in others to share with you the blame for what has happened and is happening.

SPEAKING of the Presidency, Senator Taft of Ohio formally announces that he will seek the Republican nomination. His announcement, of course, isn't much of a surprise.

Taft is an able man. He has one of the clearest minds in Washington. He is so good that he isn't afraid to change his mind when it is made plain to him by FACTS that he has been wrong. He has courage enough to face and accept responsibility.

But he lacks a quality that for want of a better name we term "oomph," "zil," etc. Personal magnetism is a somewhat more formal name for it. Whatever it is, it is the quality that causes people to throw their hats in the air and cheer themselves hoarse for the man who possesses it.

TAFT lacks it. Without it, it is improbable that he can be elected. If he can't be elected, he can't do any good.

That is about the way the cards lie.

AS to the Presidency, this is a significant writer in the mood to vote next fall for ANY man—Democrat, Republican or Independent—who seems to have what it takes to yank this country out of its doldrums and get us back on the right road.

Falling clear and positive proof, this writer will vote for whatever candidate SEEMS TO HAVE IT IN THE LARGEST MEASURE. These are times when WHAT IS BEST FOR OUR COUNTRY is the only standard that should be considered.

THE ELLSWORTH OPINION

For the first time since Congressman Harris Ellsworth was elected to his high office, we have been able to get him pinned down long enough for a reasonably sufficient conversation. Heretofore our talks have been very sketchy affairs with frequent interruptions, and with the Congressman barely a hop-skip-and-jump ahead of innumerable speaking engagements, conferences, interviews, appearances, etc.

But now he is home with a cast on his leg. He can accept few engagements, and has been forced to take what might be termed at least a partial recess from the dizzy whirl of work in which he has been constantly engaged for nearly six years.

By cornering him at his home, where he had no escape, we have been able to obtain some of his opinions and impressions on various affairs, particularly the international situation, in which he is especially engrossed at present, having only recently returned from an aerial tour throughout the major part of Europe. It was in Italy that he fractured his ankle while alighting from a taxi. He stepped on a rolling stone and must wear a walking cast until his injury heals. He was flown back to The States and returned home while his impressions were still fresh in his mind.

We have talked with him at length about the international crisis and find that his opinions make a good deal more sense, to our mind, than a lot of the material we have been reading and hearing.

Our national leaders seem to have the idea that there is a race between democracy and communism and that we can woo European peoples away from communism by bribes in the form of food and financial relief. Consequently we are going to great lengths to conserve grain and are making huge loans, for the often-expressed purpose of keeping Europe from going communist.

Ellsworth has a decidedly different slant on the situation, as persons who heard him recently in a brief radio interview learned.

Russian communism is a doctrine of government by power, Ellsworth contends. The Russians, who have the eastern philosophy of power, use military force, chaos, confusion and defiance to gain political control through minority groups. Once in power, these minorities retain authority by rendering opposition forces impotent, using the purge, if necessary, to keep down opposition leadership.

But Western Europeans, Ellsworth believes, have had enough of totalitarian government. They have learned the lessons of government by power; have seen and still see the rubble, death, horror and distress forming the natural aftermath and logical consequences of totalitarianism. Every recent election in Europe, Ellsworth points out, shows a swing away from communism. Concessions have been made toward socialism, but communism definitely is losing ground, he contends.

Leaders not only in this nation but elsewhere have interpreted Russia's swaggering, bullying and irascibility at the U. N. tables as a parade of power and defiance. Ellsworth believes, on the other hand, the attitude is evidence of fear, indecision and inferiority complex, bordering on desperation. Committed to a policy of government by power, realizing that its political ideology is failing in Western Europe, Russia is resorting to bluster and non-cooperation.

He does not believe Russia will use the only method by which it could put its ideology into universal operation, that of war of conquest.

Consequently, in his opinion, we are placing our international policy upon the wrong foundation. Millions of people in Europe need food. This food should be provided as a simple humanitarian act. There should be no effort to tie our relief efforts into politics, nor to hold out food as a bribe.

Next to food, the European people need jobs. Their industries have been wrecked, their markets destroyed. They will need financial assistance in reconstruction. Our own economy depends largely upon ability of other countries to trade with us. Consequently, we can best benefit ourselves by helping Europe.

Our long-range recovery program for Europe, however, should not be motivated by political considerations, Ellsworth believes, nor should we use loans as a means of inducing European peoples to oppose communism.

We should, Ellsworth contends, make loans, not gifts. Our loans should be secured; be so sound that they could be underwritten by private capital.

That sort of argument seems to us to make sense. We don't like this idea of Uncle Sam playing Santa Claus the year around. Uncle Sam grew strong when he developed his ability as a shrewd Yankee trader. He commanded the respect of the world, not for hard, but fair and honest dealings. By dint of industry, he grew strong.

But in late years he has destroyed moral fibre in our own country by handouts until great numbers of our people no longer value thrift and personal independence, but are willing to become recipients of a dole. Now Uncle Sam proposes to use his traditional generosity to destroy financial independence internationally—A One World WPA.

We hope Ellsworth and those who follow the same views will be able, when Congress meets again, to get some common-sense thinking into the heads of some of our administration leaders.

Classes to Resume At Myrtle Creek

MYRTLE CREEK — Classes at the Myrtle Creek School will be resumed Wednesday in the Odd Fellows Hall, City Hall, Grange Hall, and the theater. It was announced today by Superintendent of Schools Ivan C. Parker. Classes were suspended following a fire which damaged the high school building Thursday night.

School will be opened with an assembly of all classes in the theater Wednesday morning, Parker said. High school classes

probably will be resumed in the Odd Fellows and City Halls. Faculty members have been "busy" making these buildings suitable for classroom purposes, Parker explained.

It is expected that the new high school now under construction will be ready for use in January, Parker added. Fire damage in the old high school building included destruction of the heating plant. When the building is fully repaired in from four to six weeks, heat will be supplied from the new boiler house.

The extent of damages resulting from the fire has not yet been fully determined, Parker said.

Keep Your Lawn Green by Letting Water Soak Deep

More lawns die from lack of moisture than from any other cause. Sprinkler systems are effective if allowed to run long enough. This is true for all types of watering equipment. Established lawns can not exist for long on the light waterings recommended for germinating a new lawn. Run the water slowly so it will penetrate the soil, not run off the surface. This encourages deep rooting. Light sprinklings cause surface rooting since the roots grow in the direction of their food and drink. In hot or windy weather the surface area dries rapidly, leaving the roots in that parched and dried out state. A thorough soaking forces the moisture deep into the soil. It is better to flood your lawn once a week than to sprinkle lightly every day. On a sloping surface the water tends to run off if applied too rapidly. So take it easy. It's effective to let the water run slowly, then turn it off for a while, finally resuming the watering again. Irrigate either early in the morning or very late afternoon. Watering around nine o'clock at night is convenient and a most economical method for there is practically no evaporation at this time. Sealing may result from watering during the middle of a hot day.

Fertilize in Two Seasons
It's wise to fertilize in spring and in fall (before the cold weather sets in) with a well balanced plant food, either liquid or dry. For a really luxurious growth fertilize at half the regular rate once every eight weeks. New lawn areas may be fed after all grading and leveling has been completed at the rate of 4 to 5 pounds per 100 square feet. Rake the fertilizer thoroughly into the top soil. Then keep the area moist for at least three days before seeding so that the plant food can be taken up by the soil. Old lawns should be cut closely and commercial fertilizer applied at the rate of 3 to 5 pounds per 100 square feet. Water immediately afterwards and keep the lawn moist for three to four days. Do not apply commercial fertilizer when the lawn is wet as severe burning might result. If liquid plant food is used observe carefully the directions on the package.
