Accidents Over Weekend Kill Six in Washington

Accidents took the lives of six persons in Washington State Saturday and Sunday. Two brothers were killed in a plane crash near Colville, two persons died in traffic mishaps, a hunter was killed by a stray bullet and a Spokane railroad man was crushed between two railroad cars.

The brothers, Harry Dunwoodie, 32, of Spokane, pilot, and Robert Dunwoodie, 21, of Colville, were killed as their two-place plane crashed at the edge of an orchard two miles north of Colville.

John Hayes, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Hayes, Seattle, was fatally injured when a car in which he rode with four companions struck a parked vehicle in West Seattle early Sunday.

Raymond James Russell, Spokane, was fatally wounded when struck by a stray bullet while hunting yesterday near Newport. Deputy Sheriff Ernest Black said Russell's brother, Zales, told him the bullet apparently came from a hillside nearby.

Floyd Taft, 31, Port Orchard, died en route to the Pierce County Hospital Saturday after an accident on the Seattle-Tacoma Highway, and Chester A. Potter, railroad car inspector, was caught and fatally crushed Saturday between the couplings of two box cars.

Final Battle for Western Europe About to be Joined

The final and crucial battle for Western Europe between bolshevism and democracy is about to be joined—and the outcome of this engagement will go far toward determining whether free men shall continue to be free.

The strategy of the democracies is to provide the Nations of Western Europe with the sinews for self-defense against red aggression. Eastern Europe for the time being must be considered as under Soviet domination, but while communism has made much headway in Italy and France, there still may be time to rescue these two important countries and protect the rest.

This strategy is encompassed in the Marshall plan. President Truman now has summoned congress for a special session which will consider implementation of the plan as well as pressing home problems.

The bolshevist strategy is to smash the Marshall plan and thereby render Western Europe impotent before the red drive. The communists also have aimed upon all the countries of Europe to be steadfast in opposing "American slave loan conditions" and thereby precipitate a crisis in the United States. After that, says Moscow, anti-capitalist Russia can cooperate with capitalist European nations.

This scheme was laid on the line by General Zhdanov, one of bolshevism's head men at the recent conference in Poland between the Soviet Union and the countries under its domination in Eastern Europe. That meeting was, in fact, a briefing for the battle of Western Europe.

Showdown Nearing
Events are moving rapidly as both sides get set for the big showdown. Last week saw two interesting developments, both of which may have an important bearing on the situation.

One of these was Moscow's announcement that Nikolai V. Novikov, Soviet ambassador at Washington, has been removed from his post. There was no explanation. All we know is that Novikov was regarded as an advocate of Russo-American friendship and cooperation. In fact he told the Chicago council of American-Soviet friendship on June 19 that America and Russia could live together peacefully, despite their different economic systems. On July 27 he departed for Moscow, apparently in good health, but later Russia notified Washington that he was ill.

The other development was Turkey's charge in the United Nations that Russia was carrying on "psychological aggression," "warmongering" and "interfering in Turkish internal affairs." The significance of this, of course, lies in the fact that ever since the war Moscow has been trying to compel Turkey to give Russia a share in control of the Dardanelles—strategic waterway between the Black Sea and the Mediterranean. The communists are putting more heat on the Turks, coincident with the preliminaries to the battle of Western Europe.

And how do we evaluate this

If they can be held to their present empire, the chances of ultimate conflict will be greatly lessened. Indeed, time may take a decisive hand and remove the threat by changing—in one way or another—the nature of totalitarian communism.

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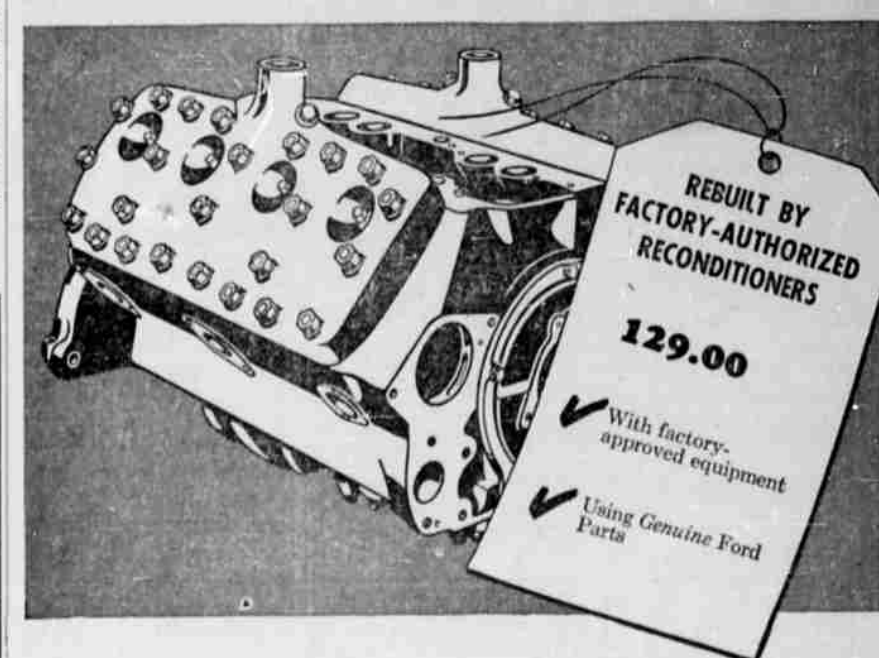
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
