### Reinvestigation Given County Welfare Cases

An annual administrative review and reinvestigation of cases currently filed with the Douglas County Welfare Department was given Saturday by the administrative review staff of the State Welfare Commission, said Mrs. Claude Baker, county welfare administrator. The staff included Virginia Moore, Forest Grove; Margery Cole and Vivienne Goldberg, Portland, and Eileen Donaldson, Salem. The reinvestigation is an annual function required to adjust aid grants according to the need of elderly persons, dependent children, and the blind.

## Forget-Me-Not Sale Scheduled Nov. 8 by D. A. V.

"Give a little for those who gave a lot!" With that theme, blue forget-me-nots, flowers of remembrance, will be sold in Roseburg Nov. 8 by Dean Perrine Chapter No. 8 of the Disabled American Veterans.

Funds contributed by flower purchasers during the annual drive are used by the D.A.V. chapter for its work among this city's disabled veterans, their families and their dependents, as well as the widows and children of deceased veterans.

Art Newell, commander of the D.A.V. chapter, in announcing the forget-me-not sale, said today:

"I want the people of this community to know that when they buy a forget-me-not from one of our volunteer workers they are contributing directly to helping their own neighbors—neighbors who were disabled in defense of our great nation."

"These disabled veterans have sacrificed as much as it is humanly possible to sacrifice and still continue to live. The coins dropped in our forget-me-not boxes are little in themselves, but added to other contributions they go a long way in making life just a little bit easier for our disabled defenders, their dependents, and their widows."

The D.A.V. maintains a free service to all veterans in their efforts to obtain adequate compensation and pension. Newell said it assists in the proper presentation of claims for government benefits both for the disabled veteran and his family.

### Snell Asked to Act to Cure Shortage of Nurses

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 27.—(AP)—The American Nurses' Association asked Governor Snell today to call a conference of state pub-

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lic health and nursing officials to take steps to cure the shortage of nurses.

Katherine J. Denford, Minneapolis, president of the national association, telegraphed him that the way to relieve the shortage would be to improve nurses' working conditions, give the association more control over placement of nurses, and to provide more legal control over nursing practice.

Governor Snell said he would comment after he studied the request.
