WHY DO IT PIECEMEAL?

By CHARLES V. STANTON. It is not to be expected that annexation of adjacent territory to the City of Roseburg will be accomplished without strong resistance.

A great many residents, owning property outside the city limits, located where they did to escape city tax rates. They enjoy most of the benefits of the city—entertainment, proximity to employment, school facilities, church, transportation lines, etc.

But eventually the time comes when some require additional city services and seek annexation to obtain sewers and sewage disposal, street lighting, fire and police protection, etc. With increasing population, annexation becomes mandatory in crowded areas.

But there are still people residing in the "fringe" who want no part of annexation—and we can't say that we blame them, except that their attitude indicates lack of vision.

For instance, we have in mind a man who bought a large acreage of "fringe" property for speculation. He is planning to break it up into lots and place it on the market.

They take no account of the western movement of industry and population. They are totally oblivious to the new trend of the timber industry toward specialized manufacture and utilization.

Here in Douglas County we are cutting approximately one and one-half billion feet of timber annually. Yet our utilization of that timber is only about 30 per cent.

Thus, by raising our utilization from 30 to 50 per cent, we would create many more jobs in the lumber industry than exist at present.

Patton's Journal Raps Montgomery, Others for 'Errors'

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Gen. George S. Patton, Jr., stormy wartime commander of the United States Third Army, vigorously criticized British Field Marshal Montgomery and also directed blame at top American officers in an abridgement of his war journal published today.

In pungent, crisp phrases, Patton declared his belief the war in Europe would have been shortened and thousands of lives saved but for "the momentary error of the war" which he blamed on Montgomery's influence with SHAEF.

Patton wrote, "It was evident at this time that there was no real threat against us as long as we did not allow ourselves to be stopped by imaginary enemies."

Patton specified his respect for and friendship with Gen. Omar Bradley, his superior as commander of the Twelfth Army group, but he did not hesitate to tell of disagreements.

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Recent government studies show that U. S. farmers have converted the record wartime and postwar incomes into markedly better living conditions.

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Secrecy Shrouds Killing of GIs in Trieste, Charge

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Rep. Marion T. Bennett (R-Mo.) declared today that "many" American soldiers have been killed or wounded by Communists in the Trieste area behind a "brass curtain of American military censorship."

The Missouri lawmaker, recently returned from a six-week tour of Europe and the Near East, said there have been "63 incidents of armed aggression by the Communists" against United States forces since they moved into the former Italian territory, bordering on Yugoslavia.

"These acts have resulted in the death or wounding of many American soldiers," Bennett added. "I have the names and identifications of the incidents as furnished me by our military intelligence."

"In Europe they call it a 'cold war'. It is war and how soon, or if, it will engulf the whole world, no men outside of the Kremlin can say."

"The brass curtain of American military censorship has done a remarkable job of keeping from the American people the seriousness of the situation at Trieste."

The Army declined comment on Bennett's statement. Attribution Causes Tension. There have been no previous reports of any American casualties resulting from the long-standing tension between the predominantly Italian population of Trieste and the Yugoslavs.

When the free state came into being last September 16 under terms of the Italian peace treaty, the British military commander credited American forces with having prevented an incident which "might have led to bloodshed."

American troops refused to allow a force of Yugoslav soldiers to cross the border into the area assigned to Anglo-American occupation. The Yugoslavs occupy the southern sector. Each of the occupying nations was asked to assign 5,000 troops to serve until a yet-to-be-designated governor reports no further need for them.

Bennett's trip abroad was made as head of a House Commerce subcommittee studying civil aviation. He said his observations convinced him that the United States should maintain the strongest air force and navy in the world "and with the most atom bombs."

He said Russia is producing "45,000 tanks a month and has jet planes in the skies over Europe."

The "Colossus of Rhodes," a bronze statue of the sun-god Helios, took 12 years to build and has been called one of the world's first lighthouses.
