'Covered Wagons' Poems Issued By Douglas Pioneer

Mrs. S. Watson Hamilton, well-known Douglas County pioneer, is represented in the verse collection recently published, "Poems of the Covered Wagons". Mrs. Hamilton, who crossed the plains as a small girl, wrote her recollections 50 years afterwards in a book of rhymes. Two parts of the book have been selected in connection with all the covered wagon poems written since the 40's.

Editor and compiler of the volume is historian and novelist Dean Alfred Powers of the state system of higher education, who formerly was a resident of Douglas County. It is published by the Pacific Publishing House, Portland in an attractive format with 36 illustrations.

The book contains in all 70 poems divided into nine sections by the noted poets, by the emigrants, the Santa Fe Trail, the Oregon Trail, the Mormon Trail, the Forty-Niners, plains and deserts, road's end, dim trails.

Among the Oregon poets included, besides Mrs. Hamilton, are Joaquin Miller, Sam Simons, Frances Fuller Victor, Ben Hur Lampman, S. A. Clarke, G. C. Applegate, Abigail Scott Duniway and Verne Bright.

Jersey Throng Forces Reds to Cancel Meeting

TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 28.—(AP)—A boisterous, jostling crowd estimated at 3,000—mostly police and Chancery Court order—last night forced cancellation of a Communist meeting which was to have heard Gerhardt Eisler, who has been described as the No. 1 Communist in the United States.

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'Warmonger' Label Effort of Russia Defeated at U. N.

LAKE SUCCESS, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Russia Monday gave up her effort to have the U. N. "condemn" the United States, Greece and Turkey for alleged "warmongering."

In an effort to save his anti-"warmonger" resolution from defeat, Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vishinsky accepted a Polish amendment which dropped the specific charges against the three countries involved in the Truman aid program.

The general assembly's 57-nation political committee then rejected the Polish amendment by a vote of 23 to 18, with 14 abstentions. This knocked out the first paragraph of the Soviet anti-"warmonger" measure which specifically named the U. S., Greece and Turkey.

The committee defeated the second paragraph of the Soviet proposal, which declared that "toleration" of "war propaganda" by any nation was a violation of U. N. charter obligations.

The Polish compromise move came shortly after France, Australia and Canada laid a new

point proposal before the United Nations assembly's 57-member political committee as an alternative to the Soviet proposal.

The joint proposal, submitted to replace separate resolutions by France, Australia and Canada, appeared to have substantial backing and was said by some delegates to have a good chance of approval.

It provided that:
1. The assembly condemn all forms of propaganda "likely to provoke or encourage any threat to the peace, breach of peace or act of aggression."
2. The assembly request all governments to promote friendly relations "by all means of publicity and propaganda available" and to encourage the dissemination of information designed "to give expression to the undoubted desire of all peoples for peace."
3. The assembly ask the forthcoming world conference on freedom of information and of the

press, which meets in Geneva next March, to consider methods for achieving these aims.
The United States in last week's debate had opposed not only the Soviet resolution, but the individual proposals of France, Canada and Australia.

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
