Good Seeds May Need Help to Grow In Your Garden

There are many reasons why a 100 per cent stand is not very likely when you sow seeds. But don't blame the seed. Chances are there is nothing wrong with the planting material; possibly your method is not all it should be. There are federal and state rules governing the sale of garden seeds and if you purchase from a reputable dealer there is little to worry about concerning the quality of the seed.

Dealers are prohibited by law from selling vegetable seeds if the germination falls below a certain prescribed minimum. But remember that seed have certain peculiarities of their own and all cannot be treated in the same manner. For example, the soil should not be too damp for bean seeds. Excess moisture in the soil may cause the beans to rot in a very short period of time. On the other hand seeds such as the beet require comparatively large amounts of moisture to effect germination.

Keep in mind that thin-shelled seeds require less water for germination than hard-shelled seeds. Germination can not proceed until sufficient moisture penetrates the covering and reaches the germ of the seed. Because beet seeds are surrounded by a spongy covering extra moisture may be required.

Seed inoculation is desirable with all leguminous crops such as beans, peas and alfalfa. Inoculation consists of covering the seed with cultures of bacteria which enable the plant to grow faster and also to be a healthier specimen. By examining the roots of these legumes you will note

is removed from the surrounding atmosphere by the bacteria and "fixed" so that the plant may use it. When this occurs the plants do not draw so heavily upon the nitrogen that is locked in the soil.

Ample Nitrogen Needed

Legumes are heavy nitrogen feeders and if the proper bacteria are lacking the nitrogen content of the land may be seriously depleted. When inoculating legume seed be sure to use the proper type. For example, the inoculant recommended for treating alfalfa seed would not also be proper for other clovers or beans or peas. The process itself is quite simple.

The seed is placed in a watertight container. Then sufficient water is added to barely cover the seed. The proper amount of the inoculant is added and the seed stirred so that it becomes covered with the inoculating material. The seeds are then planted and a bumper crop may be anticipated.

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
