year" election in which a considerable number of states overwhelmingly elect governors belonging to the MINORITY party usually foreshadows a change in NATIONAL administration.

That (as nearly as we can compare our system with theirs) is what happened in Britain Saturday.

BRITISH Conservatives are jubilant—just as Republicans in this country were happy after our 1946 election. They are demanding that the Labor government RESIGN and call a new election for members of parliament.

That calls for some explanation. Under the European system, a sharp rebuff to the majority (ruling) party can be and often is the occasion for an election to choose NEW members of parliament. The point in this situation is that the outcome of MUNICIPAL elections isn't automatically accepted as such a rebuff. Still, under the European system, it COULD be so accepted if the majority party felt itself so weakened in popular support as to be unable to carry on the business of government successfully.

It is a sharp rebuff in PARLIAMENT that automatically brings about the fall of the existing government and the calling of new elections. That didn't happen in this case. In parliament, the Labor party still holds its overwhelming majority and it is to be presumed that it will carry on.

Still, it did get a jolt in Saturday's municipal elections.

IN government, as in cookery, the proof of the pudding is in the eating thereof. If the pudding is good, the eaters praise the cook and call for more. If the pudding is bad, they want a new cook.

These municipal elections in Britain do suggest clearly that British voters are by no means pleased with the Labor government pudding they have been eating.

SENATOR VANDENBERG advocates a separate peace with Germany if the council of foreign ministers remains deadlocked on the subject throughout this winter. He thinks it will be better if the foreign ministers come to terms, but adds that disagreement among them mustn't be allowed to postpone peace. Peace, he says, must "have priority over everything."

Most of us will agree with him.

THE senator accepts generally the principle of the Marshall plan for restoration of Western Europe, but adds that Germany's restoration to a "viable" autonomy lies at the core of Europe's rehabilitation.

He uses such big words that we have to reach for the dictionary, which defines "viable" as "capable of living; capable of developing." He thinks that if Germany isn't allowed to go on living and developing Europe will be in a mess.

Let's put it this way: If industrious Germany isn't allowed to MAKE THINGS to get Europe back on its feet, we'll have to make the things AND GIVE THEM AWAY. Either that or see Western Europe fall into the destroying clutches of communism.

That's about the long and the short of it.

GERMANY, since the end of the shooting war, has been handicapped under a sort of glorified international WPA system. Any kind of WPA system, if continued long enough, robs human stamina away. We can certainly see this process at work in Germany.

AH, THOSE AMERICANS!

Europeans declare it is impossible to understand the American mind. World events bear out the fact that peoples of other nations suspect and fear us largely because they can't and don't think the way we do and, consequently, are unable to realize or evaluate our motives and purposes in international affairs.

Here in Roseburg Friday night we will have a perfect example of why the American mind is an enigma to peoples not subject to the American way of life.

Friday night we will see—and hear—several thousand Roseburg football fans pleading, urging, demanding the defeat of one of their best personal friends. Try to explain that to a Russian!

Mel Ingram coached the Roseburg Indians last year. This year he is coaching the Grants Pass Cavemen, who will play on Finlay Field Friday night in the annual battle between these two rivals. Ingram was a popular coach. He had exceptionally fine support and cooperation from fans. He had an unusually large number of close personal friends. But, almost without exception, his friends, the fans who supported him last year, and the students he coached, will be ardently rooting for the defeat of Ingram and his Cavemen by the Roseburg Indians. And Ingram expects it and probably wouldn't think much of anyone who would let personal friendship change his loyalty from the home team.

We understand why allegiance remains with the home team, no matter who the coach may be, but some of our friends from across the seas would call us unstable, fickle, uncertain, contradictory. And when we endeavor to translate our American mind and way of thinking into such issues as free speech, freedom of press, free elections, personal liberties, etc., in discussions around the United Nations conference tables, our European friends are as totally unable to understand what we mean as they are to comprehend how we can howl ourselves into a frenzy in seeking the scalp of one we acknowledge to be a close, personal friend.

"Ah, those Americans!" Yet our American spirit makes this season's meeting with Grants Pass THE game of the year. Our sensational Indians could lose every game remaining on their schedule and still have the blessing of home-town fans if they only trim Ingram's Cavemen Friday night. And don't be too surprised if they do just that!

We haven't been able to learn where Coach Cecil Sherwood has been finding all those rabbits he has been digging out of hats this season, but his magic certainly has worked.

He was not supposed to have any kind of a team this year. His material was young and inexperienced. He had virtually no lettermen. Yet he has been turning in some sensational victories and undoubtedly has some tricks saved back to spring on the Cavemen. Sherwood's prophecy that the Indians must be reckoned with in state competition next season already offers evidence of accuracy.

Undoubtedly the Indians have been encouraged in their remarkable achievement this year by the support given by local fans. Attendance at games has far surpassed that of any previous year. Already the grandstand has failed to provide sufficient seating capacity, and still crowds increase. Steps to organize financial support for athletic activities in elementary grades have shown the team that the sports program has popular support and backing. We doubt whether Coach Sherwood could have accomplished his miracle of team building had this evidence of public support been lacking—had games been played before half-empty stands.

But, on the other hand, fans have been well repaid for their cooperation. They have seen the Indians in unexpected victories. They have seen a team developed from a standing start into an exceedingly speedy, hard-hitting, aggressive and smart organization.

And, as an entertainment premium, fans have been thrilled by one of the classiest and snappiest high school bands to be found anywhere—a band which is sharing popularity honors with the rampaging Indians.

So, we're expecting the season's record attendance for Friday night's game, as Mel Ingram's friends yell themselves hoarse for his defeat.

"Ah, those Americans!"

Northwest States Settle Tax Claim On Whiskey Deal

OLYMPIA, Nov. 4.—(AP)—

Settlement of income taxes in the 1943 liquor deal involving acquisition of the Waterfall and Frazier and Shawhan Distillery Corporations by the States of Washington and Oregon was announced today.

The asserted \$4,300,000 in federal income taxes were settled for ten per cent of approximately \$430,000, it was announced in a joint statement issued by L. E. Gregory, chairman of the Washington Liquor Control Board, and Atty. Gen. Smith Troy.

The announcement said the threatened liability on the part of Washington and Oregon was ended by a compromise approved by the tax court.

Neither Washington nor Oregon contributed any money toward the compromise, the announcement said.

During December 1943 the Washington State Liquor Control Board and the Oregon Liquor Control Commission completed the purchase of all the shares of corporate stock of the two liquor corporations.

In this manner the whiskey of the two corporations was acquired by the two states.

The commissioner of Internal Revenue considered the purchase of stock as purchase of whiskey from the two corporations and therefore levied income and excess profits taxes. Settlement by compromise came after several years of conferences.

'Underground Railway' Aids Refugees Abroad

BERLIN, Nov. 5.—(AP)—An American military government source said yesterday that Stanislaw Mikolajczyk was added in his dramatic 15-day flight from Warsaw to London by a sort of "underground railway" set up by U.S. and British military intelligence sections to help "interesting personalities" escaping from East to West.

This informant said the Polish peasant party leader fled Warsaw Oct. 29 and arrived in the British zone of Germany Saturday.

here said those who helped him comprised a team especially trained and practiced in aiding persons escaping from the East to the West, such as scientists, technicians, scholars, politicians and others. This source said such persons were being moved westward at a rate of two a day.

"We get some hot customers—hot with the breath of the Russian pursuers on their necks," the informant said. "Some of these have been Russian scientists who fled the Soviet Union and made their way to the United States or British sectors of Berlin and appealed to us as refugees."

Margaret Truman Wins Audience, Not Critics

FORT WORTH, Texas, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The unopposed charm of Miss Margaret Truman easily won 2,500 Texans who attended her first southwestern concert last night, but the performance was received with mixed comment by the critics.

E. Clyde Whitlock, music critic of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, and Pericles Alexander, assistant music critic of the Dallas Morning News, both were more impressed with the lighter numbers presented than in portions from Mozart's "Le Nozze Di Figaro."

"There are vocal faults, lacks and limitations," Whitlock wrote, "but it is significant that they are amenable under understanding guidance." Whitlock said the president's daughter "completely captured her audience by her sincerity, her naturalness and her unpolished charm," adding "she has remained close to her native Missouri soil and the people love her for it."

Weed Control Equipment To Be Displayed Nov. 6

An exhibit of weed control equipment will be held in Roseburg Thursday, Nov. 6, at the Specialized Parts and Equipment Co., N. Stephens St. at W. Douglas.

Ouster From Cabinet Stirrs Jap Political Row

TOKYO, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Prime Minister Katayama fired Agriculture and Forestry Minister Hirano from his cabinet post today, starting a political storm which threatened Japan's coalition government with new pressure from both left and right factions.

Katayama's abrupt ouster of his food administrator was a move in the undercover political struggle between the prime minister's social democratic party followers and conservatives who hope to control the government before the peace treaty is signed.

It was the first time in Japanese history a government head had fired one of his ministers without a cabinet resignation.

Katayama said Hirano was "non-cooperative," and that he removed the minister in the interest of cabinet unity.

Incendiarism Suspected In Fire Death of Girl

PORTLAND, Nov. 4.—(AP)—An incendiarist was believed responsible for the death today of Betty Jean Thralls, 21, burned in a fire Saturday which destroyed her home here.

She collapsed in a bedroom closet and was rescued by her father, James Thralls, and a neighbor, both of whom suffered burns and cuts in the rescue.

The fire marshal's office reported that three investigators were studying the ruins and that ashes were being given laboratory analysis in brief. A suspected arsonist, also, was believed set, had occurred in the same district earlier that day.

Ousted Foremen May be Put Back Under T-H Law

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—(AP)—

The Justice Department today told the supreme court the Taft-Hartley act does not take from the National Labor Relations board the power to order reinstatement of discharged foremen.

At the same time, in a separate case, the department said the new law requires nullification of a recent supreme court decision that Jones and Laughlin Steel Corp. must recognize the CIO Steelworkers Union as the bargaining agent of plant guards.

The Taft-Hartley act excludes supervisory workers from the classification of "employees" entitled to protection under the labor relations law. Because of this provision the Vail Manufacturing Co., of Chicago, filed a petition with the supreme court asking cancellation of a 1945 board order to reinstate two foremen and give them back pay.

The justice department, in a memorandum signed by Solicitor General Philip Perlman, urged the court today to disregard the Vail plea.

Perlman contended the foremen were discharged because they had refused "to participate in a fraudulent plan," he said, the company sought to list the two as non-supervisory employees so as to have them vote against a union in an election which the board was conducting among non-supervisory employees.

State Farm Head Denied Injunction in Milk Case

SALEM, Nov. 5.—(AP)—The

State Supreme Court yesterday refused to grant State Agricultural Director E. L. Peterson an injunction which would have permitted him to enforce his order compelling dairies to charge one cent per quart additional for milk sold in fibre of paper containers.

The court now will proceed to hear Peterson's appeal from an order of Circuit Judge Duncan of Marion County, who ruled that Peterson had no authority to issue his order.

Peterson asked the Supreme Court to issue an injunction to prevent enforcement of Duncan's decision pending the Supreme Court appeal.

The suit was brought against Peterson by Sunshine Dairies of Portland.

Vets' Bonus Plan to be Offered in Washington

SEATTLE, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Plans to place a World War II bonus issue before the state's voters at the next general election by initiative petition were disclosed today by Al Rochester, Seattle, chairman of the Veterans of Foreign Wars legislative committee.

To be eligible veterans must have been bona fide residents of the state for at least a year prior to entering the armed services. The rate of payment suggested by the VFW would be \$15 a month overseas duty and \$10 monthly state aid.
