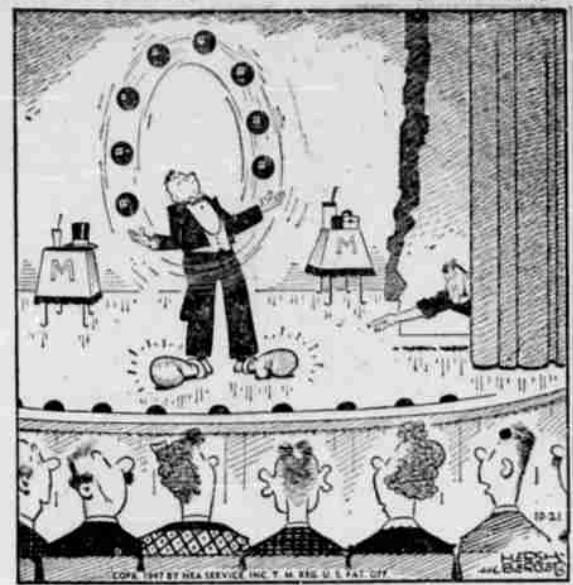

H. P. Sconce, Jr., Dies in Portland

Haywood Pressley Sconce, Jr., 13, son of the Rev. and Mrs. H. P. Sconce of Roseburg, died at Doernbecher hospital in Portland yesterday, following a rare heart operation performed by Dr. Wm. Conklin, nationally-known surgeon.

Haywood was born in Kansas City, Kan., March 3, 1934. He joined the First Baptist Church here at the age of 9. He was in the 8th grade at Roseburg Junior High School, and had received all his schooling here. Besides his parents, he is survived by two brothers and one sister, Marvin, 11; Peggy Lou, 6; and Johnny, 2. His maternal grandparents, Rev. and Mrs. Marlan D. Price of Duff, Colo., and paternal grandfather, D. W. Sconce of Mammoth Springs, Ark., also survive.

Byrnes Raps Russia for Holding Jap Prisoners

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Former Secretary of State James F. Byrnes called on the United States to demand the immediate return of an estimated 328,000 Japanese prisoners which he said Russia is holding in violation of the Potsdam agreement.

In an address last night before the House of Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church, Byrnes also was strongly critical of the time France, Belgium and Britain are taking in repatriating prisoners held by them.

"Our good faith is involved," he asserted, because we took the initiative in the Potsdam declaration that promised Japanese troops a safe return home to encourage them to surrender.

Russia, he said, is bound by the pledge, but the Soviet government nevertheless has taken hundreds of thousands of prisoners into Russia.

Kentucky Win Of Democrats Makes Truman Happy

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—President Truman said today he is very happy over the democratic victory in Kentucky, and is happier still about the large turnout of voters in Tuesday's off-year elections.

He told a news conference that while he had not analyzed the election returns, the volume of voting showed the people are learning the responsibility of citizens is especially important.

The future of free government, he added, rests at the ballot box.

A reporter asked whether he thought a heavy turnout of voters in next year's presidential election would help the Democrats.

Mr. Truman solemnly replied that he thought a heavy vote would help those who like free government.

But he again dodged any commitment of his own 1948 plans.

Asked whether he had made a choice of a running mate, the president laughed and called it a leading question.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Kentucky democrats today claimed their biggest election victory in several years, as mounting tabulations from Tuesday's voting boosted previous margins.

Democratic Rep. Earl C. Clements, governor-elect, headed the party's nine-man state ticket swept into office in the General Election. The party also increased its majority in both houses of the general assembly and gained control of city administrations in Louisville and several other cities.

Unofficial reports from 3,607 of Kentucky's 4,056 precincts gave Clements 349,756 votes and his republican opponent, Atty. Gen. Eldon S. Dummit 258,139.

Clements was endorsed by leaders of both the AFL and CIO unions for his labor record in Congress, including his vote against the Taft-Hartley labor law.

Dummit defended the labor law in several of his campaign speeches.

The new governor will succeed Republican Gov. Simeon Willis, taking the oath of office on Dec. 9.

Noted Actress of Past Decades Passes On at 69

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Mabel Van Buren, the "Girl of the Golden West" in Cecil B. De Mille's picture of that name three decades ago, is dead. She was 69 when she succumbed Tuesday after a brief illness.

She was a stage actress before De Mille starred her after development of feature length films in 1914. Her pictures included "The Warrens of Virginia," "The Man from Home," "Bluebeard's Seven Wives," and "The Crusades."

She continued in pictures until the death in 1941 of her husband, James Gordon, Shakespearean actor. She is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Catherine Wyman (Actress Kay Van Buren) and a granddaughter.

Tooth Brush Use Slated for Pupils

CHICAGO—A two-year test with school children is expected to show just how effective careful brushing of the teeth is in preventing tooth decay.

The study is being launched by the University of Illinois College of Dentistry, and will involve 2,000 sixth and seventh grade youngsters in three downstate communities.

The children will be asked to brush their teeth at their desks

each morning and afternoon, and after each evening meal at home and before going to bed. The amount of tooth decay will be compared with that in other children who will continue brushing their teeth according to their usual habits.

The tests also will study the effectiveness of three kinds of dentifrices. One is a new kind, developed at the college and containing ammonium compounds, which in limited tests has shown a sharp reduction in tooth decay.
