PUBLIC INVITED TO MINERAL SHOW TO BE HELD NOV. 15-16TH

Citizens of Roseburg and Douglas County will soon have the opportunity of viewing one of the most interesting and colorful exhibitions ever staged in this city.

Members of the Umpqua Mineral Club are making extensive preparations for the forthcoming Mineral Show to be held in the Home Economics room at the Junior High School Building on November 15th and 16th. The Saturday show will be in progress both afternoon and evening, while the Sunday display will be confined to the afternoon showing only. There will be absolutely no charge for this interesting exhibition.

It is hoped that everyone in Roseburg and vicinity will take advantage of this exceptional opportunity to see the spectacular collections of rocks and minerals amassed by local rockhounds. The display will not be confined to the local collectors only, however, as invitations have been extended to all who wish to put their collections on display. A number of out-of-town exhibitors have signified their intentions of attending with the finest of their specimens.

About two years ago the club put on a similar show on a much smaller scale. It was not a public event and consequently only a privileged few were fortunate enough to see it. The club feels that the public is entitled to enjoy the results of years of extensive and intensive collection on the part of club members, and takes this opportunity of presenting the best of these collections for both pleasure and instruction.

Perhaps the most interesting exhibit will consist of fluorescent rocks which must be viewed with the aid of a black light. A special lamp is necessary to bring out the gorgeous and unsuspected colors in the fluorescent rocks. A fine display of 111 mounted thunder egg transparencies is another one of the exciting exhibits which should not be missed. Agates, polished and in the rough, petrified and opalized wood, teredo wood, quartz, stibite, and countless other stones will round out a display well worth the time and attention of all.

It cannot be stressed too strongly that this is a show not only for the mineralogist and those interested in all the earth sciences, but in its beauty and variety it will also appeal to the person who thinks a rock is merely an object upon which to stub his toe. Anyone with an eye for beauty or a flair for the unusual cannot fail to enjoy the Mineral Show at the Junior High School on November 15th and 16th.

Copco Gets Permit for New Issue of Stock

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The California-Oregon Power Company yesterday was authorized by the California State Public Utilities Commission to issue \$4,200,000 in preferred and \$840,000 in common stock.

The preferred, consisting of 42,000 shares, will be of the 4.70 per cent series. The common will consist of 42,000 shares.

The company intends to refund and redeem its 6 per cent preferred stock series of 1927 of which there is \$4,376,100 outstanding. It will offer holders of the old preferred share-for-share, paying the difference between \$110 per share and the as yet undisclosed public offering price of the new issue. There will be no common exchange.
