MINERAL CLUB TO BE OPEN TO PUBLIC

There is an old saying to the effect that "there is nothing new under the sun." This has been modernized to read, "Now I've seen everything!" But wake up, Chum, and consider that science has made some remarkable discoveries in the last few years. Perhaps there are still a few thrills left for you.

Take the little item of fluorescent rocks. Have you ever heard of them before? Or have you ever seen any? Well, you're going to have the opportunity right soon, and at no cost or disadvantage to yourself.

On November 15th, afternoon and evening, and on the afternoon of November 16th, the Umpqua Mineral Club is staging a very comprehensive Mineral Show in the Home Economics room at the Junior High School building. Here you may quench your curiosity regarding fluorescent rocks.

At first glance, however, you may think you have been misled, for in the common light of day these masquerading rocks look as drab and uninteresting as any pebble of bar run. But in the dark and under the magic rays of black light they suddenly burst into a blaze of technicolor that leaves the onlooker speechless with amazement and delight.

Of course there is a technical explanation for this sudden change of character, but we won't delve into that too deeply. To make it as simple as possible, the grayboards tell us that these fluorescent rocks are composed of neutrons, electrons, and all stuff like that, which revolve around the nucleus in a certain direction. Sounds crawly, doesn't it? But under the black light the neutrons and electrons

change their course and charge off at a tangent. This explains (or does it?) the amazing change of color in a seemingly simple and unimpressive rock.

When the black light is removed the neutrons et al return to their normal routine, just going around in circles and getting nowhere fast. Sometimes, however, this change is not effected immediately and the rock will continue to glow with color for a short time. Then the specimen is not only fluorescent, but phosphorescent as well.

You may think I sound like I have rocks in my head, but if they are fluorescent rocks, who cares!
