Predators Losing Battle Against Modern Weapons

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Coyotes and their predatory pals—wolves, bobcats and the like—are fighting a losing battle against the new weapons of man, the Fish and Wildlife service said today.

New traps, new poisons and, most of all, greater use of airplanes are responsible, said Clifford C. Pressnall, assistant chief of the agency's division of predator control. But there'll always be coyotes and bobcats and wolves, he said—the government wants to keep them under control but not to exterminate them.

"Even though the counted number of coyotes killed during the 1946-47 fiscal year—103,582—was slightly less than the year before, western stockmen agree we're doing a much more thorough job than in the past," Pressnall told a reporter.

Hunters firing from a plane, or dropping poison from the air, cannot see all their victims to count them, Pressnall explained. Use of the coyote-getter—a tiny cyanide gun set to discharge into the mouth of the animal which nuzzles the bait—also means that many victims wander into brush to die, where they cannot be counted.

Pressnall said the tally for the year ended June 30 included 919 bears killed, 6,508 lynx or bobcats, 1,460 wolves and 127 mountain lions.

"We've been taking the emphasis off the number of animals killed and have been emphasizing this year the benefits achieved," Pressnall said.

"Very enthusiastic reports on the use of planes against predatory animals have been received from Wyoming, Oregon and Nevada. For the range pests of old, it's a losing fight against our modern weapons."

Predatory animals killed during the year ended June 30 as listed by the service included: Oregon—149 bears; 434 lynx-bobcats; 8,712 coyotes, 13 mountain lions.

Peeping Tom at Pendleton Shot

PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 13.—(AP)—Residents of Pendleton's south side rested somewhat easier today after a man was shot in the leg by Police Officer Leon Woodward who caught him peeping into a house in that district Monday night, according to Police Chief Charles Lemons.

The man, Millard DeWitt Brown, 35, identified by Lemons as a Utah parole violator, was held in a hospital on an open charge. His wound was described as minor.

Lemons said a telegram from Utah authorities reported Brown had been paroled from prison Oct. 27 after serving time for burglary. The wire also said Brown previously had served time in a Colorado prison.

Woodward reported he shot Brown in the thigh when the convict ignored three commands to halt after the police officer saw him peering under a window.

Lemons said residents of the south side district had been terrorized during the past week or so by peepers. However, the chief was not prepared to say if Brown was solely responsible.
