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## Improvements at Elkton High Noted

ELKTON—New changes in the high school, designed to give greater educational benefits and to increase utility of the school building, were reported this week by H. E. Parks, Elkton High School principal.

Sliding doors have been installed, dividing the old auditorium into two separate rooms. The new room at the rear is now a social studies room while the other is the new English room. Shelves and study tables are being built, books are being treated with shellac and new numbers are being painted on them. The library is expected to be in full operation soon.

The senior relations class has

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recently completed a study of the building and its efficiency. Authorities in school administration have set 25 square feet per pupil as the space requirement for standard classrooms. From this figure the high school building could now care for a maximum of 128 pupils if it were possible to operate 100 per cent efficiently. However, this is not possible, particularly for special purpose rooms such as the commercial and home economic rooms, and the shop, Parks pointed out.

The building was found to be 88 per cent utilized by the 49

pupils in school at the time of the study. This figure indicates that twice as many pupils could be cared for with practically no additional cost to the district.
