The Umpqua board representatives included Bob Mode, chairman; Ted Roadman, and Mrs. Delorne Henry, clerk. Their meeting with Turnbull was at Mrs. Gorrell's office.

Monday evening Turnbull met with Glide school directors for a discussion of plans for Glide's projected high school building. Turnbull met with James Vaughn, chairman of the school board; Phil Strader, and Omer J. Monger, principal at Glide.

Construction scenes at Dillard and Winchester were visited by Turnbull Tuesday. At Dillard, four new rooms are being added and at Winchester, two rooms.

Another State Department of Education official visiting the county this week is Henry Sorick, recently appointed a supervisor in the field of secondary education. He is visiting high schools at Glendale, Riddle, Canyonville, Days Creek, and Glide.

YOUNG TREES PLANTED
Planting of young trees in cut-over areas of the Umpqua National Forest is a current project of Rangers John Montgomery and Milton Andrews. The trees, principally Douglas fir, are seedlings from the Forest Service's Wind River Nursery near Carson, Wash. Next spring, planting is scheduled to start in the Rondeau Burn, located seven miles upstream from the mouth of Jackson Creek. The area was burned over in 1939 and is approximately 1,000 acres in extent.
