many (and Austria; Austria is a comparatively minor issue) will involve getting the foreign armies of occupation out. Don't expect Russia to pull her armies out as long as she has any hope of using them to increase confusion in Europe, thus helping to upset the recovery of Europe.

KEEP this same thought in mind in reading the news from France and Italy.

In the background of the communist disturbances in both countries is Moscow's determination to derail the Marshall plan if she can do so without shooting war. If the Marshall plan works, if by means of it we can lift Western Europe out of its doldrums and give its people hope for the future, Moscow will have suffered a severe defeat.

INSTINCTIVELY, we think of the conference in London as a simple meeting of the foreign ministers (our secretary of state corresponds to what most other countries call a "foreign minister") of Britain, Russia, France and America to try to work out some plan to make the post-war world click.

That is the way business men in our country work out such things. When a snail develops, the head men get together to see what can be done. This foreign ministers conference isn't quite that simple.

Dispatches from London inform us that approximately 500 "aides, secretaries and experts" will be present to back up their chiefs. In addition, some 300 newspaper men will be gathered from all over the world to report what happens (or at least what they are permitted to know about what happens.) London's hotels are jammed with "delegation staffs."

A gathering of that many people isn't simple in anybody's language.

GETTING back to the Marshall plan, Senator Vandenberg made the senate for SPEEDY APPROVAL of 397 million dollars of emergency aid for Europe "to defeat the lurking tyranny of communist aggression." (This "emergency" money will be spent chiefly for food to keep people over there from getting too hungry and fuel to keep them from getting too cold; people who are cold and hungry aren't likely to listen to hard common sense, which is the basis of the so-called Marshall plan.)

Vandenberg adds a word of description of this "lurking tyranny of communist aggression." He says:

"A new type of communism is on the march. . . . It operates not only through ruthless pressures on often terrorized satellites. It operates through internal subversion and sabotage in other lands where its trained and disciplined minorities faithfully contribute to the chaos and confusion which encourage communist conquest."

WITH our background of constructive development by means of the arts of peace, it is hard for us to understand a situation like that. We think it COULDN'T HAPPEN.

If you'll re-read your history, you'll be forced to the conclusion that in his time Genghis Khan was hard to understand. So was Attila. But both were REAL. Both HAD to be met and dealt with.

It is always possible that what has happened before can happen again.

Walcott's Camp Mum on Plan Of Battling Louis

GRENLOCH, N. J., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Just like a football team on the eve of the big game, Jersey Joe Walcott has gone into seclusion for his Dec. 5 title bout with Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis.

From now until he breaks camp at this hamlet on the Black Horse pike, some 20 miles from Philadelphia, Joe's advisers plan to keep him inaccessible to reporters for interviews.

The theory back of this maneuver, explained Joe Webster, Walcott's manager, is "we want Joe to fight Louis according to the plan we have devised. We want to avoid the well-known, but confusing advice he sometimes receives. Everyone is welcome to watch Walcott's public workouts, but no more interviews."

Naturally everyone in camp is mum on Walcott's plan of attack, but his workouts indicate the challenger hopes to puzzle the champ with "cute" tactics. He went four rounds yesterday, keeping constantly on the move. He apparently has mastered a neat little trick of slamming home a left hook to the body, followed by a quick step to the right simultaneously firing an overhand right to the head.

Myrtle Creek 11 To Battle Amity In Semi-Final Playoff

Unbeaten during their first season of 11-man football competition, the Myrtle Creek Vikings will face Amity High School in a state B league semi-final playoff in Roseburg Saturday.

Counting the nine games won last year in six-man football, the Vikings have had 15-game winning streak without a setback, said Coach Forest Loggery.

Counting up this season's six wins, the Vikings garnered 72 points to their opponents' 28. Myrtle Creek scored two wins in succession over the Roseburg B team, 60 and 12-0. There were two victories over Bandon, 7-6 and 13-9. The Vikings walked off Kerby 27-13, and eked out a win last week, 7-6, over Mills City.

"Very little is known here about Amity High School team, except that they are reported to be very heavy for B school team, with a line averaging 185 pounds per man," said Loggery.

The game with Amity will be played on Finlay Field Saturday afternoon. Myrtle Creek school officials said they had to "fight" to bring the game here, instead of letting it go to McMinnville, as Amity wanted.

Mr. Coad was born at Lincoln, Kansas, on Oct. 21, 1885, made his home in Portland for a number of years and was admitted to the Roseburg hospital from the Vancouver Veterans Hospital. Surviving is a sister, Miss Nola Coad, Portland.
