Future Farmer Champion Steady Money Maker

GARBER, Okla.—Ray Gene Cinnamon is just 19 years old but he is already a full-time farmer and is worth more than \$20,000.

The personable youth has been selected as the outstanding Future Farmer of America for 1947 but that is just one of the many titles he has received since entering farm youth work in 1940.

At Garber, he was football and basketball captain, class president, and chapter and state president of the FFA. Last April he married the queen of the Garber FFA chapter.

He now has 400 acres under his supervision and this year netted \$2,454 from 120 acres of wheat. Besides this, he pastures about 100 cattle and has hogs, sheep and cats.

Last year, his first out of high school, he had a net income from his combined farming of over \$5,000.
