employees to strike." He adds that "communist elements are using intimidation and menace and are trying to create an atmosphere of terror."

WHAT France needs, and must have if she is to get back on her feet, is to work and produce. She is suffering from a shortage of things, and the only way to get more things is to produce them.

It seems probable from this distance that the bulk of the French people must recognize that fact and equally probable that they would WELCOME a government that would restore order and make it possible to get back to work without fear of intimidation.

If a gang of OUTSIDERS were terrorizing the Umpqua Basin, we'd want the state government of Oregon to crack down on them. That is what government is for.

FROM London comes word that in the new session of the British Foreign Minister Bevin is acting as a sort of moderator between Russia and the United States.

If true, it is a good idea. All business men know that when a clash comes up and somebody gets stubborn and unreasonable some sensible person usually asks: "Who can go and talk to him?" If the right man can be found, a costly struggle can often be averted in this way. If it works in business, it MIGHT work in diplomacy.

If we can stave off the shooting long enough, the ruckus between us and Russia will finally die down. This writer is optimistic enough to believe that communism can not permanently endure in a world that wants peace, freedom and plenty.

Communism just isn't organized to produce these things.

IN Washington, the house foreign affairs committee lops 108 million dollars off the proposed 597 million dollar fund to supply emergency aid this winter to France, Italy and Austria.

At the same time, it tacks on 60 million dollars for aid to China.

ECONOMY is always a good thing to keep in mind. If you can do the job satisfactorily for less, why, DO IT FOR LESS.

Still, the house committee's action doesn't just seem to fit the situation. When we say to ourselves that getting Europe back onto its feet is worth 489 millions to us but ISN'T worth 597 millions, it doesn't make sense.

If that's the way we feel about it, we'd better wash our hands of the whole affair and GET OUT NOW.

AS for the 60 millions for China, nobody doubts that the Chinese are even hungrier than the Western Europeans. A starving Chinaman is as pitiful as a starving European. And it is just possible that China may be as important in our future as Europe.

But what would 60 millions amount to in feeding China? It wouldn't be a drop in the bucket.

If we're going to tackle the job of saving the world, let's at least be REALISTIC about it. Otherwise we'll get no farther in the way of salvation than you get when you give a dime to every bum who panhandles you on the street.

IDOLS WITH CLAY FEET

The small group of Hollywood writers and actors who traveled to Washington to defy the congressional committee investigating un-American affairs, and who surrounded their junket with typical Hollywood fanfare and trimmings, seems to have stirred up a hornet's nest. Not only have they succeeded in getting themselves cited for contempt but will be out of jobs pending settlement of their respective cases, with the added possibility they will be booted out of the profession unless they can show non-communistic leanings, which, under the circumstances, looks somewhat difficult. The Washington junket by this group of movie folk apparently was plotted to embarrass the congressional committee. Special efforts were made to publicize the affair in the best Hollywood sidishow tradition. Radio time was purchased to broadcast the smart-alek replies of witnesses in transcribed programs of proceedings. But it now appears the attempt has boomeranged and it is the wisecracking writers and actors who are embarrassed.

The witnesses may have a technicality in support of their claims. Under court procedure, a witness cannot be forced to give testimony which would incriminate him. The Hollywood witnesses stood on this technicality when asked whether or not they were members of the communist party, claiming such question to be an invasion of their civil rights.

On the other hand, really, if we are to get technical, the investigation is being conducted to determine the extent of communistic infiltration into the motion picture industry. It is not concerned so much with the individual as with the industry as a whole.

The interesting point, however, is how the communist and fellow traveler wraps his constitutional rights around him whenever he is in trouble, while doing his best to undermine that very constitution to which he runs for protection.

He uses his utmost endeavor to destroy our constitutional form of government, he creates chaos and confusion, he infiltrates into every possible governmental function and into school, press, radio and screen, trying to overthrow our constitution and bill of rights, but weeps and wails about invasion of his constitutional rights whenever he runs afoul of forces of law and order.

And don't think for a moment that the communist is lacking in knowledge of constitutional law. The trained communist and, in fact, the majority of fellow travelers, know the constitution and bill of rights better than most constitutional lawyers. They use it freely in their own defense while striving industriously, at the same time, to destroy it.

Our danger from communism is not from the run-of-the-mill political radical, the type of have-nots and professional "agitors" who cannot conform to ordinary rules for protection of society. Our danger lies, rather, with the so-called "intellectuals" who find in communism a plaything to feed their vanity, release inhibitions, and provide a vehicle for "genius."

We have had an example of the effects of impractical "thinkers" in politics. Simply because a man is an expert in philosophy at a leading college or university does not mean he is an authority or specialist in politics. Most of the crackpot experiments in government we have undergone in the past few years have stemmed from such sources. We have many writers, including some well known columnists, cartoonists and others who dabble with pink shaded politics—fellow travelers, if not outright communists. They find in communism a slightly dangerous toy which provides outlet for their sparkle and genius. They love the cloak-and-dagger aspects of their political plaything. Being impractical minded, they can ignore the sordid and degrading aspects of communism while writing or preaching the "fellowship of man." Because these people command public respect for their talents, success and position, they become potentially dangerous. Their views are quickly accepted as gospel by great numbers of sycophantic readers or listeners who fail to reason or analyze for themselves.

In such great industries as motion pictures and the press, which affect the thinking of the general public, communism has its greatest opportunity for infiltration. It is expedient therefore that we be made aware of the efforts of communism in these fields.

The ironic use of the bill of rights to defeat an investigation into communistic infiltration, particularly when accompanied by Hollywood horseplay, should give loyal Americans cause to stop and think, and to look for clay feet before they start idolizing.

Joint Farm-Home Loan Maximum to Aid Two Brothers

Details this week were being completed on the first maximum combination state veterans' farm and home loan, which will go to two brothers, Billy Erwin Gilbert and Myrtle Eugene Gilbert of Sherwood. The Gilbert brothers combined their benefits to apply for a \$12,000 loan to purchase a 160-acre dairy farm at Rural Route 2, Sherwood, in Clackamas County.

Loan Officer L. A. Milner of the Portland office of the State Department of Veterans' Affairs said the brothers' property appraised for more than enough to permit the maximum loan of \$6,000 to each.

The only other combination loan was made in September to a set of twins, Richard G. Stoy and Robert E. Stoy, amounting to \$7,000 to buy a farm at Powell Butte near Prineville in Crook County.

Applications for the popular loan to Oregon World War II veterans for the purchase of farms and homes continue to increase monthly, according to department loan officials. Largest number of loans for any month was 80 in October amounting to \$301,400, for an average loan of \$3,767. In October, 1946, only 20 loans were made, at an average of \$2064.

The Oregon loan permits the

veteran to borrow up to 75 per cent of the appraised value of the property, to a maximum of \$6000. Interest is at four per cent. Applications are made through county and veterans' organization service officers, or direct to the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs, State Library Building, Salem, and 416 S. W. 11th Avenue, Portland. No appraisal fee is charged the veteran where the loan is not completed. Where the loan is completed the veteran pays \$25 to apply toward the cost of appraisal, attorneys' fees and the recording fee for the mortgage. The director will pay all over \$25 for these costs.

Horse, Vehicle Racing Planned At Fair Grounds

Harness and saddle racing, together with motorcycle and mid-get auto races are scheduled for the coming spring and summer season at the Douglas County fairgrounds, Sig Fett, secretary of the County Fair Board, reported today.

Grading the new race track at the Fair Grounds has been completed, and the course will be surfaced in the near future.

The Fair Board has started construction on a barn with accommodations for 24 horses and proposes to enlarge the structure from time to time as necessary. It is expected sufficient funds will be available this year, Fett states, to build the first unit of the exhibit buildings required to permit resumption of the annual county fair.

This first unit, he states, will be large enough for 4-H club fairs and possibly will house the 1948 Northwestern Turkey Show. Additional units will be added for myear to year, as funds are obtainable, and installations will go with the needs of the county fair and other events proposed to be accommodated.

May Go Into Circuit

The season's race program includes plans for a series of local saddle races. Many members of the sheriff's posse and of the various riding clubs are owners of fast mounts. It is expected that much interest will result in competitive race meets between amateur riders.

It is planned, if possible, to place the Roseburg track on the professional harness racing circuit.

The plans also include regularly scheduled amateur motorcycle race meets, and regular bookings for midget auto races.

Funds for construction now in progress were obtained from the annual rodeo, sponsored by the Douglas County Sheriff's Posse, and from state race receipts, Fett said. No tax money has been used.

Revenue Needed

"While our purpose from the start has been to provide facilities for resumption of annual county fairs, we have had to work toward this goal gradually," Fett explained. "A fair does not furnish any great amount of profit. Consequently we have been sponsoring events which produce revenue."

The rodeo has been very profitable. The posse, which sponsors the annual rodeo, does not receive one cent from the profits of the event. All money left after expenses are paid goes to the fair board's treasury and we are spending this money on further development.

"The race program also should be profitable and we will have still more money to spend on facilities to house a county fair, without relying upon taxpayers for assistance."

Fett announced plans to construct more chutes and other structures to speed rodeo events. Instead of requiring approximately two hours to complete the various competitive events, it is planned to offer the same program in less time by reducing the time interval between contests. This will make possible, Fett said, a number of competitive races to add thrills to the rodeo, keeping every moment jam-packed with entertainment and providing many more diversified activities in the two-hour program.

In addition to a larger and faster program for next year's rodeo, Fett said, the planning committee is outlining a number of events which will lend much more color and interest.

Gold Standard Held Sole Inflation Remedy

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Rep. Buffett (R-Neb.) told the House yesterday the United States must go back on the gold standard as "the only sound cure for our inflation sickness."

Bills are being prepared, Buffett said, to restore the right to private ownership of gold and to provide for minting and free circulation of gold coins.

If Congress does not deal soon and effectively with the increasing cost of living, Buffett said, people will stop saving their money and:

"A mass abandonment of dollar saving habits would be a major calamity, especially as a mass flight from the dollar would almost surely follow."

Developments in the inflation field, Buffett said, "will influence and probably determine the outcome of 1948 elections."

Gen. Leclerc, French War Hero, Dies in Plane Crash

PARIS, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The air ministry announced tonight that Gen. Leclerc, France's famous armored warfare leader, was killed in an airplane crash in the Sahara Desert.

It was understood that 12 persons were aboard the plane and that all were burned to death.

Leclerc, lately inspector general of French North African forces, headed a French division in the U. S. Third Army's drive against the Germans and led French forces into Strasbourg and Paris.

No Gasoline Rationing On West Coast, Assurance

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 28.—(AP)—A spokesman for the West Coast petroleum industry said today there is "virtually no possibility" of gasoline rationing to retailers in the Pacific states.

Don Gilman, executive vice-president of the Western Oil and Gas Association, said he was speaking for California, Oregon, Washington, Nevada and Arizona, but that he doubts if any rationing will be necessary anywhere in the West.

Repeal of Overtime Pay Requirement Sought

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Repeal of the fair labor standards act requiring overtime pay for work in excess of forty hours a week was proposed today by Rep. Max Schwabe (R-Mo.).

Schwabe introduced legislation for the immediate repeal of the act during the period of emergency aid to Europe.

His proposal also would set aside the present 40-cents-an-hour minimum wage rate.

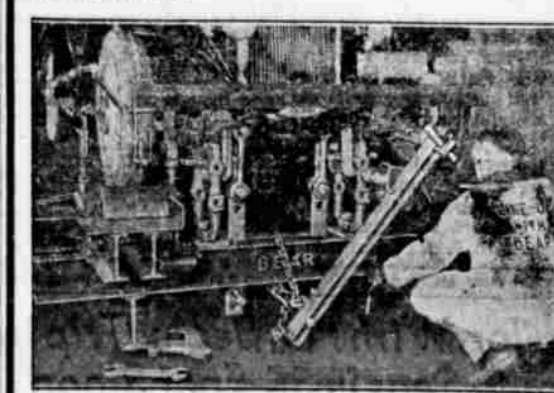
