Pianist

"Up to now I have been called a Cuban pianist, and rightfully so; but at present that appellation is a bit outdated as I am an American citizen and proud of it," explained Jorge Bolet, internationally known master of the keyboard, who will be presented by the Roseburg Community Concert Association tonight, November 29, at 8:15 o'clock at the Junior High School auditorium. Bolet's career is a mixture of music, war and the Good Neighbor Policy—an assorted background from which he has emerged one of the foremost pianists of the day.

Havana-born Jorge Bolet received the major portion of his musical education in his country at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia. Following his graduation from the Curtis school, Bolet toured Europe—Paris, London, Vienna, Madrid, The Hague, Amsterdam and other major continental music centers. Then he returned to the United States to win the coveted Naumburg Award, which carries with it the privilege of a Town Hall recital.

With the opening of World War II, he enlisted with the Cuban army, however, the Cuban government decided to take advantage of both his command of the English language and his familiarity with the United States by sending him to Washington as assistant military attaché of the Cuban embassy. It was Bolet's mission to aid in keeping Cuban-American military cooperation at peak effectiveness and in promoting cultural understanding between his country and the U. S. through concert appearances.

In December, 1944, political changes at home rendered Bolet's commission void. The pianist diplomatically answered this challenge by immediately enlisting in the United States Army. After six weeks as a private, he was chosen to be a volunteer in the United States Army. He is a veteran of two armies.

Sent to Tokyo as Second Lieutenant, Jorge Bolet, on an assignment with the U. S. army of occupation, the pianist made musical history when he staged, directed and conducted the first production ever seen in Japan of the Gilbert and Sullivan classic, "The Mikado." Performers and technicians were drawn not only from American enlisted personnel, but also from native Japanese musicians. He also appeared four times as soloist with the Nippon Philharmonic.

Since his discharge from the Army two years ago, Bolet has toured Mexico, Central America, the West Indies and Latin America and has recorded several programs for the Canadian Broadcasting Company. Cuban audiences have often heard him as soloist with the Havana Philharmonic under such noted conductors as Erich Kleiber and Massimo Freccia.

The young pianist's achievements in this country include the Joseph Hofmann award; appearances in New York, Philadelphia,

Baltimore, Boston, Detroit and elsewhere; orchestral engagements with the Philadelphia Orchestra under Eugene Ormandy; and annual Carnegie Hall recitals which are among the "musts" of the New York season.

When Jorge Bolet (you pronounce the "t") is not at the piano, he is a man who "in his time plays many parts." His diversions include those of the gourmet, the after-dinner storyteller (a talent which accounts for his many supper invitations), and the photographer with a particular yen for scenes of animal life.
