WHY this tense situation in France (and the correspondingly tense situation in Italy?) This is about it:

The communists have to beat the Marshall plan to the draw.

If the Marshall plan gets going—

If it begins to work—

If we start to make good our commitments under it—

If the 16 European nations that have accepted it and are preparing to go to work under it do their part—

If order begins to come out of chaos and a reasonable degree of comfort, well-being and hope begin to replace the despair that now grips Western Europe—

THEN—

It will be forever too late for the Moscow communists to try to rule Europe and after Europe the world. The ways of free enterprise, of freedom of the individual, will then have proved themselves superior to the way of communism.

So the communists are ACTING NOW, while there is still time.

ALL this, of course, is guesswork on the part of this writer, who has no sources of information inside the Kremlin. But it seems a reasonable guess.

In Washington, the house foreign affairs committee, urging prompt action on the \$200 million "stop-gap" aid bill that is the first step of the Marshall plan, makes public a report in which it says that Soviet Russia now has four million men under arms.

The chairman of the committee was asked from the floor:

"What could stop Russia from taking over all of Europe in 24 hours?"

He answered:

"Not a thing."

HE went on:

"Russia proposes to conquer the world either by internal infiltration, by revolution or by force of arms. . . I believe Russia desires to achieve an actual conquest by arms as long as possible. . . The Soviets (meanwhile) have a clear and definite policy of attempting to prevent American aid to Europe or Asia and a further policy of making such aid as ineffective and expensive as possible."

THESE are indeed serious times. Important decisions must be made. The result of these decisions will be far-reaching.

In making these decisions, we must be PATRIOTIC rather than POLITICAL.

ACTION OVERDUE

The State Sanitary Authority is reported to have ordered seven Oregon municipalities to submit plans for sewage disposal plants. At the same time, suit was filed against one firm accused of discharging industrial waste into an Oregon stream, while others were directed to show cause why their alleged pollution should not be abated.

The action of the board is long overdue, but we have grave doubts that immediate results are to be expected.

The State Sanitary Authority was created in 1938 and empowered to enforce pollution laws. While a comparatively few cities have built sewage disposal plants since the Authority was created, pollution, particularly industrial waste, has increased steadily, and, with growing population, municipal wastes are in greater quantity than before.

It is high time, in our opinion, we were getting some aggressive action. Perhaps the board means business this time and will carry through on its demands.

Louise Aaron, writing recently in the *Oregon Journal*, reported that 86 Oregon communities are working on plans for sewage treatment and disposal plants, with an estimated cost of \$28,000,000. The article, however, failed to state that the various municipalities have only a relatively small part of the necessary finances on hand, and it will be many years before most of them can carry out their programs, unless given some assistance.

In this column we have previously advocated a state revolving loan fund financed by bonds or out of state financial reserves.

If we are to lick the pollution problem within the lifetime of our present adult population, it will be necessary to obtain faster action than we have had in the past.

The Pendleton *East Oregonian* has long been crusading for an outright state grant to aid municipalities with sewage disposal. The Bend *Bulletin* holds the state grant proposal to be unfair to communities which, like Roseburg, have installed their disposal facilities without grants. To the suggestion of a state revolving loan fund, offered in this column, the *Oregon Statesman*, Salem, has declared it to be a "needlessly cumbersome method," claiming that "virtually all of the cities of the state have reduced their indebtedness to a point where they have prime credit themselves," that "they can issue bonds to private investors at a very low rate of interest," and that, therefore, there is "no need to have the state mixed up in the deals."

It may be entirely possible that the municipalities of Marion County are sufficiently debt free that they can afford to build sewage disposal plants, but the *Statesman's* editorial writer certainly did not have the financial problems of Douglas County municipalities in mind when he made his statement.

Myrtle Creek, for instance, is one of the towns ordered by the State Sanitary Authority to submit plans for sewage disposal.

Myrtle Creek was credited by the 1940 census with 441 population. It is probably around the 2500 mark at the present time, and is planning to hit 5,000 within 10 years. It recently sold its electrical distribution system to procure funds with which to supply water. It has bonded to the legal limit both for municipal and school purposes. With its school facilities totally inadequate, it recently suffered fire damage to its school building. We would like to have the *Statesman's* editor show us where Myrtle Creek has any "prime credit." Yet, Myrtle Creek, within a few years will be one of Southern Oregon's stalwart, thriving communities. Right now it is in the midst of growing pains, and has approached bankruptcy trying to keep itself supplied with "britches." But, while Myrtle Creek is bonded to the limit permitted by law, it is one of the best of credit risks, due to its future prospects, and could and would build a sewage disposal plant if it could obtain money from a revolving loan fund.

Myrtle Creek's situation is only slightly more aggravated than the plight of other rapidly growing municipalities in Douglas County.

If we wait until our cities are in a position to pay cash for sewage disposal, without assistance from some source, most of our adult population will never live to see our streams once again flowing with pure water.

Lend-Lease Given Russia This Year Draws Senate Quiz

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Senator Bridges (R-N.H.) demanded today that the State Department "produce the individual responsible for what he said was the shipment of \$16,000,000 in lend-lease supplies to Russia this year."

Bridges told Robert A. Lovett, undersecretary of state, that the Senate Appropriations Committee wants to know "who figured the deal, who authorized these shipments to Russia and specifically what was shipped" before it votes any funds for emergency aid to Europe.

The Senate has passed a \$597,000,000 aid-Europe bill and the House is now debating a \$590,000,000 one including help for China.

But if the general idea of aid for Europe wins congressional approval, the Senate and House Appropriations Committees still will have to pass on bills providing the funds.

Bridges is chairman of the Senate group which had Lovett before it for a discussion of the aid proposal.

The New Hampshire senator told the undersecretary that the committee also is going to go into "the very stupid policy this government is pursuing in Germany permitting the dismantling of plants there and their shipment to Soviet Russia and her satellite countries."

"We want to know whether we are going forward or backward," Bridges declared. "You might as well face this issue before this committee. Either Communism is a threat and we are putting our money and resources into efforts to stop it or we are not."

Lovett replied that he had no personal knowledge of the shipments to Russia, but understood they were made up of purchases by Russians before lend-lease expired, stored by them in this country and subsequently shipped by them.

Western Union Facing Strike Threat Over Pay

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Officers of three AFL unions said yesterday that unless the Western Union Telegraph Co. reconsiders its position and either agrees to arbitration or makes a wage proposal of at least 50,000 of its employees out side New York City "is inevitable."

The union officials made their announcement after a meeting with company representatives and Jacob R. Mandelbaum, assistant director of the U. S. Mediation and Conciliation Service.

The unions seek a 15-cent-an-hour wage increase and late last month began a strike vote, the result of which is expected to be known Dec. 15.

The union leaders said they agreed to arbitrate the wage issue, but that the Western Union refused to make a counter-offer to their wage demands and also rejected Mandelbaum's proposal for arbitration.

Oregon Gas Rationing Not Likely, Oil Official Says

PORTLAND, Dec. 5.—(AP)—H. D. Collier, San Francisco, chairman of the Board of Standard Oil Co., of California, foresees no prospect of gasoline or fuel oil rationing in Oregon next year unless military demands should suddenly increase.

Collier said California, which produces one fifth of the nation's crude oil, is being asked to supply 51 per cent of this country's military requirements.

Consequently, though the crude oil supply in the west is "a little tight," there should be enough for 1948, Collier said. He declined to predict what the situation would be in 1949 or 1950.
