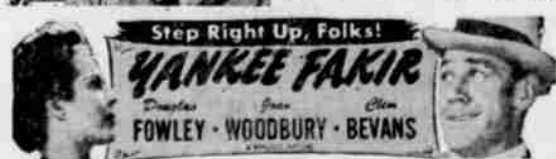

Christmas Carols Naming Nativity Under School Ban

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—(AP)—An assistant superintendent of school yesterday banned the singing of Christmas carols making reference to the Nativity and celebrations having "religious significance" in 23 Brooklyn public schools.

It drew an immediate protest from the New York State Council of the Knights of Columbus which termed it "an insult to all Christians" and demanded a public schools system investigation to have the order revoked.

Assistant Superintendent Isaac Bildersee, in charge of the public schools of two districts, declared in his order:

"Christmas, and other similar occasions, may be celebrated only as season, pre-vacation occurrences. There must not be any reference in dramatizations, song or other aspects of the occasion to any religious significance involved."

Explaining his order, Bildersee said personal jollity and merry-making are fine for the children of the public schools, "but the religious features of the day should be eliminated. It should not have any sectarian religious significance."

Dr. William Jansen, superintendent of New York public schools, said in a statement that Bildersee's announcement "did not ban the singing of all Christmas carols."

'New Look' Spreads In Newspapers As Strike Increases

(By the Associated Press)

The "new look" in newspapers, born of printers' labor disputes with publishers, spread to Allentown, Pa., today.

The method of publishing editions through a typewriting and photo-engraving process was used in Chicago Nov. 24 when 1,500 members of the AFL International Typographical Union walked out. Chicago's six big dailies have appeared in that form ever since.

Yesterday 80 members of ITU Local 134 Allentown walked off their jobs and company executives immediately announced plans to continue publication with the Chicago process.

The Allentown typesetters struck after turning down a 16 2/3 per cent wage increase that carried with it a provision that the recently expired contract with the Allentown Call-Chronicle newspapers be continued.

The papers' executive editor, William D. Reimert, said the union violated the contract in declaring its termination Oct. 1 without giving written proposals of changes. Such proposals are a condition of termination, he said.

Clyde Major, president of the Allentown local, said the printers' rejection was predicated on the company's refusal to acknowledge conditions of employment posted Monday by the union in accordance with national policies of the ITU.

The striking Chicago compositors are to receive today their first strike benefits from the union's national fund. Married strikers will get \$51.30 a week and unmarried \$34.20.

Wage boost at issue
New wage scales sought in Chicago call for \$100 a week for day work and \$106 for night and early shifts. The men had been earning \$85.50 for 36 1/2 hours of day work; \$91 for the same hours of night work, and \$91 for 30 hours of early work.

Publishers of the Tribune, Sun, Journal of Commerce, Herald-American, Times and News said the strike arose from the ITU's objection to the closed shop prohibition in the Taft-Hartley law and that the union has been un-

willing to agree to a contract of satisfactory length.

The union denied this and said the principal stumbling-block has been the issue of wage increases.

The two teams were coached by the Eddy brothers, C. N., of Drain, and Lyle R., of Rose School.
