The memorial was unveiled recently before a crowd of 500 tourists, old-time acquaintances of Mix and adults who had followed his screen adventures in their childhood.

Inspection Certificate For Holly Not Needed

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 8.—(AP)—Both commercial and non-commercial holly growers may ship cut holly this year without inspection certificates, the State Agriculture Department reports.

In previous years commercial growers were licensed and received shipping certificates.

Holly should be dipped in a hormone solution (available at seed stores for best shipping results, the department recommended.

Defense Lawyer Raps Murderer

TACOMA, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Jake Bird, 45-year-old transient who murdered two Tacoma women with an axe here Oct. 30 Saturday heard himself denounced by his own defense attorney as a man "who ought to hang" and then was sentenced to die at Walla Walla on Jan. 16.

Superior Judge E. D. Dodge pronounced the sentence after denying a motion for a new trial and hearing J. W. Seiden, one of two defense attorneys, say he felt no sympathy for his client, Bird was convicted here Nov. 26 for the slaying of Mrs. Bertha Kludt, 40, daughter, Beverly June, 17, was killed when she came to the defense of her mother.

"I feel," Seiden said, "that whenever any man—45 years old gets an idea that no lives are sacred to anyone, except his own, then that man is a detriment to society and should be obliterated."

"He did not consider the lives of two women. My associate (Arthur Paulsen) and I, according to our duty, have done everything to defend this man. He has had a fair trial by an impartial jury. At present my heart extends no sympathy to the defendant," the one-time Pierce County prosecuting attorney said.

Recommendation Made For New Federal Judge

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Appointment of Judge C. G. Goodell, San Francisco, to a vacancy on the federal district court bench in the northern district of California has been recommended to President Truman by Senators Knowland and Downey of California.

Knowland said Goodell is a Republican and the other three judges in the northern district are Democrats.

Goodell, now a justice of the

district court of appeals of California, was recommended for a vacancy resulting from the retirement several months ago of Judge A. F. St. Sure.
