Traitors to U. S. Go Unpunished For Flimsy Reasons

An American woman named Jane Anderson, who broadcast for the Nazis during the war as "Lady Ha Ha," has been released from an American prison in Austria. On Sept. 30, the Justice Department released her from an indictment of treason.

Miss Anderson's happy fate sent us checking back on some of the other Americans who sat out the war in Axis capitals, broadcasting appeals to the American forces to surrender. The result was not heartening.

Of the 14 that we remembered only one, Douglas Chandler, has been sentenced to life imprisonment. Ezra Pound, the poet who peddled Mussolini's propaganda, has been committed to an insane asylum. Robert H. Best, former newspaperman, has been arrested but still not tried. Fred Kaltenbach was in Russian hands the last time he was heard of.

Here is what happened to some of the Americans who stood for Hitler on the Nazi radio. Constance Drexel, Edward L. Delaney, Herbert Burgman, Max Koischwitz and Donald Day have all been released by the Justice Department. The

reason given in some cases was "lack of evidence"; in others, an inability to find witnesses; in Day's case the Justice Department simply was "no longer interested."

Britain Punishes Them

Miss Drexel was last reported to be covering the United Nations as a free-lance, and writing a book on "disarmament." Day also has improved some of his shining hours of freedom by doing a book which is published in Sweden.

The Tokyo branch of this traitorous crew, though less numerous, has fared just as well. The notorious Tokyo Rose and Robert Chisholm have been released by the Justice Department. Mark Streeter, arrested in 1945, has yet to be tried. Carl Flick has disappeared.

It is interesting to note the contrast between this government not loving and forgiving attitude toward those who worked for its defeat, and the British government's method.

The British have tried six and hanged two—William ("Lord Haw Haw") Joyce and John Amery, son of a former Secretary of State for India. It has sentenced another to hang. It has given a fourth a 10-year prison sentence and the other two five years in jail.

Our Justice Department's excuses for its leniency seem woefully weak. What better evidence than the damning broadcasts of those who have been arrested and released? Or didn't anyone—the OS, the FBI, or our civilian broadcasters—even bother to record this evidence?

Justice Demanded

Why have these people gone scot-free? We still keep our conscientious objectors in jail. But their wartime role was passive. Through cowardice, or religious scruples or other reasons, they refused to fight. But the enemy's American broadcasters were not cowards. They joined the Axis cause and tried to bring about the downfall of their country.

Is it laziness, indifference or incompetence that has won them their freedom? Or has our government so soon forgotten that we ever had other enemies besides Russia? Has it lost sight of the fact that there is other disloyalty than membership in the Communist party?

We do not think it is blood-thirsty to suggest that some of these followers of the defeated enemy—who apparently have been dismissed as harmless crack pots—at least be brought to justice. To dismiss them as being of no present interest must give comfort to those who still subscribe to the defeated enemy's doctrines. Certainly it pays poor tribute to the memory of those doctrines and to preserve Anna who gave their lives to oppose those doctrines and to preserve the America whose freedom the Drexels and Days and the rest are now enjoying.

Essay on Safety Wins Prize For Canyonville Girl

Concluding a course in safety practices for bicycle riders, the City of Canyonville and the Canyonville School District awarded first prize in an essay contest to Sue Ferguson at a general assembly Friday.

Nearly all pupils in the Canyonville elementary schools enrolled in the course in bicycle riding. Not only were the children schooled in safety, but they also went through rigid tests, while maintaining periodic mechanical inspection of their vehicles.

Closing the first phase of the school, pupils were encouraged to submit essays on the subject "What I Learned About Riding a Bike," with the first prize, a wrist watch, going to Sue Ferguson, who submitted the following:

"When you ride a bike you aren't supposed to ride double. When you come to a stop sign 'stop.' When you cross the street on your bike you should put your left hand out. When you want to pass anyone, be sure the road ahead of you is clear; also put your hand out when you pass. When you should go off to the shoulder of the road, if the shoulder of the road is too muddy and wet and you can't ride, get off your bike and walk it around the curve.

When you ride a bike at night you should have a good headlight and a tail-light or reflector. When you ride on the highway you are supposed to ride with the traffic. When you ride on the sidewalk, be careful the way you ride. Remember that the men, women, and children have the way on the sidewalk. Do not ride reckless on the sidewalk. If you run into some one you will have to pay for new clothes or the cleaning bill. When you ride on the road in day or night you must ride single file. If you don't ride single file you might get run over.

When you ride your bike you must be sure that the handle bars are tight, that you have good brakes, and that your wheels are on tight. When you ride on the street do not hang on to a truck or car and hitch a ride. When you are riding down the highway don't stand on the seat, don't ride without any hands or any other fancy things.

When you are learning to ride a bike, go to a place where you can wiggle around all you like.
