Capacity Throng Views Movies Of Yukon Wildlife

An audience which crowded the Junior High School auditorium to capacity was thrilled Monday night by the Yukon Territory and National Park motion pictures shown by James H. Bond, Portland.

The free show was sponsored jointly by the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club and the Junior High School student body.

All seats in the auditorium were filled, a hundred or more spectators sat on aisle steps in the balcony, while all standing room was occupied.

The pictures were made by Bond while conducting a census and survey in northern Yukon Territory, only a comparatively few miles from the Arctic Circle. They portrayed caribou, moose, mountain sheep, and other big game in the natural, virgin habitat, showed pictures of fishing streams and lakes, and offered many fine views, concluding with pictures made while traversing 250 miles of the Stewart river and its tributaries in a boat made from spruce roots and moose hides.

Bond, who reports he has been offered as much as \$5,000 for only that section of the film showing mountain sheep on the high Yukon ridges, presented a film taken in U. S. National Parks and Monuments in addition to his Yukon pictures.

In a brief preface he pointed out that big game thrives despite natural predators when un-molested by man, emphasizing the need for better game management in inhabited sections and urging full public cooperation in fish and game conservation work.

Frank M. Eccleston of Drain Passes Away

Frank Marion Eccleston, 77, died at the home of his daughter in Drain last Saturday after a long illness.

He was born near McMinnville April 23, 1870, and was a resident of Drain for the last 24 years. He was married to Miss Hilda Turnquist at Seattle Nov. 16, 1900. He was at one time foreman of a paving construction company and has spent some years in Canada and Alaska.

Surviving him are two daughters and two sons, Mrs. Gladys DeMeritt, Drain; Mrs. Esther Elensburg, Cottage Grove; Fred M. Eccleston, Drain; and Walter E. Eccleston, Eugene; also, a brother, Charles Eccleston, Lakeview, Oregon.

Services were held in the Methodist Church, Drain, today with the Rev. Fred O. Hunt officiating. Interment followed in Drain cemetery. Arrangements were in care of the Stearns Mortuary, Oakland.

Two Juvenile 'Bad Men' Land in Lakeview Jail

LAKEVIEW, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Two juvenile "bad men" were held here today for Baker authorities after being disarmed by a deputy sheriff near the California state line.

Sheriff Henry Cassidy said the boys, aged 13 and 14, were armed with old-style revolvers and a hunting knife each when taken into custody.

Cassidy said one of the boys hit a jailer over the head with a screw-driver Monday and attempted to escape. He was caught by Cassidy before he could get out of the courthouse.

The sheriff added that the boy, 13 years old, told him he didn't intend to hurt the jailer, he just wanted "to get home for Christmas."

Cassidy said the two ran away from home Dec. 9 and took a truck from Harper, Ore., near Baker, Dec. 14.

Truman to Name Texan For Navy Dept. Post

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—(AP)—President Truman has decided to appoint Mark Edwin Andrews of Houston, Texas, as assistant Secretary of the Navy.

The White House announced today that Andrews' nomination will be sent to the senate early in the new session of congress.

The post is now vacant as a result of the promotion of W. John Kennedy to Undersecretary of the Navy.

It was also announced that Secretary of the Navy Sullivan, with Mr. Truman's approval, will name Vice-admiral Arthur William Radford as vice chief of naval operations, effective on

Missing Plane Being Sought in Eastern Oregon

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Dec. 23.—(AP)—Several planes will be sent out this morning by the Klamath Air Search and Rescue Unit to scour the area between here and Bend for signs of a private plane missing on a flight from Elensburg, Wash., to Klamath Falls.

The plane, described as a four-place Stinson flown by Lawrence E. Short, failed to arrive here Sunday on a scheduled flight to San Francisco via Klamath.

Airport sources here said that other search planes will cover the area from Bend to The Dalles from a base at Redmond.

Patricia Schmidt May Seek Pardon

HAVANA, Cuba, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Dancing girl Patricia Schmidt's lawyer said today she may ask President Ramon Grau San Martin to pardon her and remit a 15-year prison sentence imposed yesterday for killing her lover, John Lester Mee, on his yacht in Havana harbor last April.

The attorney, Rene Castellanos, said he asked her last night about her wishes concerning an appeal and she felt it might be better to apply for a presidential pardon than to appeal to the supreme court, which under Cuban law has the right to increase, as well as decrease, lower court sentences.

Castellanos said the 22-year-old dancer from Toledo, O., was "crying all the time" and was "all broken up." Warden Carmelina Gauchon of the Guanabaco prison, where the court said she was to serve her term, said Miss Schmidt—whose professional name was Satira—was taken to the prison hospital last night in a state of collapse.
