Contributions To Christmas Ship Urged in Appeals

Although the Friendship Train makes the Pacific Northwest, there is still an opportunity for the people of this area to make contributions of food toward saving the lives of Europe's hungry millions. It was announced by V. V. Harpham, chairman of Roseburg's Christmas Ship Committee.

The Christmas Ship is expected to sail from Portland early in January loaded with foodstuffs donated from throughout Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and Montana. The ship will reach Europe and the food distributed during what relief authorities call the "death months" of January, February, and March.

The Christmas Ship Committee for Roseburg met this morning at the City Hall to discuss the collection of food and financial contributions. A goal for Douglas County of \$5,000 was announced. "From your heart do your part," is the motto of the drive.

Depot Will Be Set Up
Harpham announced that a collection depot will be set up in front of the J. C. Penney Co. store on N. Jackson St., where food in case lots only may be deposited. A receiptable will also be placed there for financial contributions, and it was suggested that individuals contribute enough for the purchase of at least one can of food.

Persons or groups who desire to make financial contributions by check or money order, should make these payable to the "Christmas Ship Committee" and mail them to the Chamber of Commerce, Harpham said.

The money will be sent to the state-wide committee at Portland, where it will be used to buy case-load lots direct from wholesalers, who have agreed to a 10 per cent

reduction on foodstuffs bound for the relief of Europe.

Foods donated locally will be hauled free-of-charge by the Southern Pacific Railroad to Portland, where it will be loaded aboard the Christmas Ship.

Churches Issue Appeal
All communities in Douglas County are invited to participate, Harpham said. Announcements of the Christmas Ship were made from the pulpits of local churches yesterday. The appeal was also directed at service clubs and fraternal and patriotic organizations.

Donors may be sure that their gifts will go directly to the needy, it was pointed out, for the American Council of Voluntary Agencies, representing 34 groups including Church World Service, American Friends Service Committee, National Catholic Welfare, and Jewish Agency for World Distribution, will handle distribution by stipulation of the federal government.

The committee in Roseburg includes Wallace A. Rapp, Archie E. Elliott, the Rev. Kenneth Knox, the Rev. H. P. Sconce, the Rev. Forrest Hill, M. W. Slankard and Harpham.

Spaghetti, Macaroni, Noodles, 10-20 lbs. (only original packing cases, no telephone wrapped)
Heavy Cereals (such as Cream of Wheat, Farina, etc. NOT flake or fluffy types).
