Heavy Practice Ended By East, West Squads

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 29.—(P)—Heavy practice was ended today as outstanding college stars representing the East and West tapered off training for the annual Shrine football game in Kezar stadium New Year's Day for the benefit of crippled children.

Both camps went through only one workout yesterday and opposing coaches scheduled only one session a day from now on.

Coaches Bernie Bierman, Andy Kerr and Howard Odell of the East squad agreed their players were in good mental and physical condition. Tony Mink of Pennsylvania, who sprained an ankle in a scrimmage Saturday, is expected to be ready for action by Thursday.

Head Coach Don Faurot put the Westerners through a two-hour workout yesterday at their Stanford University camp. The session included a dummy scrimmage, practice on offensive plays and emphasis on a defense against expected East plays.

Ultra Violet Ray Lamps Aid Truman To Combat Colds

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Two ultra violet ray floor lamps in President Truman's office have reduced the count of cold and influenza germs there by 52 per cent, White House officials reported today.

The lamps, recently installed in the oval room where Mr. Truman works and meets official callers, are to be supplemented with more ultra violet rays in the overhead indirect lighting system, said Brig. Gen. Wallace Graham, White House physician.

Other methods of combatting air-borne diseases are being tested on animals by Dr. Graham at his home, at Walter Reed Veterans hospital, and occasionally at the White House.

The presidential physician told reporters he is checking propylene glycol and at least one other substance, which he declined to name, for possible use as a colorless and odorless vapor to be sprayed through the White House.

While the president is considered to be in robust health, correspondents have noted a tendency to coughs and colds. Studies of microscopic slides ex-

posed to the air when Mr. Truman has large or small groups of visitors show a much smaller bacteria count if the ultra violet lamps are turned on, Dr. Graham said. The highest count is found during news conferences, when the office is jammed with upwards of 100 persons.

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
