## Marshall Plan Survey Asked By Senators

Probable Impact on U.S. Economy Chief Factor in Preparing Decision

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—A non-partisan survey of the Marshall Plan's probable impact on the American economy was urged today by Senator Wiley (R-Wis.).

Wiley, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said he believes Chairman Vandenberg made a good move in asking the Brookings Institution for a report on the best way to administer the aid to 16 western European nations.

But he said he thinks the findings of the privately financed research organization should be broadened to include "an estimate on how these proposed exports to foreign countries are going to affect us at home."

Vandenberg's action also was applauded by Senators Borah (R-Id.) and Taft (R-Ohio), both critics of President Truman's proposal for a four-year, \$17,000,000,000 outlay, and Speaker of the House Martin (R-Mass.).

Brooks, who has called for a "business" administration of the aid program divorced from the State Department, said he also would welcome a study by "any authoritative group which can

## Sgt. Wm. H. Upham Quits Police Job

Complete reorganization of the Roseburg Police Department under its new chief was started Friday, as the resignation of Sgt. William H. Upham was announced this morning by City Manager M. W. Slankard.

Sgt. Upham's resignation, effective Jan. 15, is the second member of the department since Calvin Baird, former State Liquor Control Commission inspector at Klamath Falls, became chief Jan. 1 in place of O. A. Kennedy.

The other resignation was that of Patrolman Robert Tracy, to whose place in the department Slankard announced the tentative appointment of Alvin E. Hughes, presently employed by the Roseburg Lumber Co. Hughes' appointment must be approved by the City Council before he assumes duty.

Sgt. Upham joined the Roseburg Police Department last spring as an identification specialist and has served as the day desk sergeant at the police headquarters. His future plans were unannounced.

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## Chicken Eggs Get Top Rating Out Of 81 Kinds Tasted

LONDON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Scientific tasters who ate 81 kinds of birds' eggs announced today they found that chicken eggs still taste best.

Dr. Hugh B. Cott of the Cambridge Museum of Zoology, who directed a three-man tasters' panel, reported the results in the scientific magazine, Nature.

With 10 as the highest possible flavor rating, chicken eggs tallied 8.8, Turkey eggs were 7.2; gull, 7.0; crow, 6.6; Duck, 6.5; wren's eggs, at 2.0, were lowest.

Among the small birds' eggs, only the house sparrow's rated high—7.1.

In general, the investigators reported, most big eggs taste good, and the little ones poor.

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## Marines To Be Sent To Greek, Italian Ports

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—A group of Marines whose number the Navy declines to disclose will sail next Tuesday to strengthen U. S. forces aboard the aircraft carrier Midway, 3 light cruisers and ten destroyers now stationed in the Mediterranean sea.

The cruiser Little Rock and two of the destroyers are based at ports in Greece, which this country has been trying to bolster against Communist encroachment. The other craft are in Italian waters.

The only due to the size of the Marine force given in the Navy announcement last night was that the men, all from the Second Division, will make the trip on a "normal size transport of 12,000 to 15,000 tons fully loaded." They will leave from Morehead City, N. C.

The men are being sent, the Navy said, for shipboard training and to "restore the total personnel on board to approximately the normal over-all complement" of the carriers and three cruisers.

Carriers in the Midway class normally carry 2,200 men, including 100 Marines, and cruisers 1,000 men, of whom 50 are Marines.

However, the Navy said American Navy ships have been undermanned for some time, apparently a hint that it would take more than the ordinary number of Marines to bring the four ships up to their "normal over-all complement."

The Navy turned aside questions whether it has plans to send additional Marines or ships to the Mediterranean later.

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## Closure Law Enforcement On Umpqua River Among Batch Of Demands by Rod-Gun Club

Directors of the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club voted Friday night to ask the State Game Commission to "adopt regulations and demand of the state police rigid enforcement" of the Umpqua River closure law, to "halt abuse of incidental catch provisions."

The directors contend that through use of its powers to impose bag limits, seasons and deadlines, the Game Commission, which will meet Jan. 9 to set angling regulations for the year 1948, has power to stop abuse of the "incidental catch" clause of the Umpqua closure law. Net fishermen are reported to have taken many tons of salmon and steelhead under the subterfuge of fishing for striped bass and shad.

Friday night's meeting was the first to be held by the club directors in the new clubhouse recently built at the Winchester recreational grounds. Director Al Newman served coffee and doughnuts following the business session.

Eight Requests Listed  
Complying with requests made by anglers at a recent public meeting called by the Rod and Gun Club to consider 1948 angling regulations, the directors will present to the Game Commission the following recommendations:

## Fourth In Jail Break Gives Up At Seattle

Klamath Falls Indian One of Escapees; Jail Yields Under Poised Knife

SEATTLE, Jan. 3.—(AP)—One of four escaped prisoners from the Grays Harbor county jail at Montesano gave himself up at the sheriff's office here today and said the other three had compelled him to join in the break Thursday night.

The escapee, who appeared at the sheriff's office in company with his father, was Thomas John Stafford, 30, who was serving a six-month jail term for attempted burglary.

Meanwhile, Sheriff Mike Kilgore said at Montesano there was no clue to the other three since an abandoned stolen car was found at Shelton, about 40 miles from the scene of the break.

The other three in the break were Silas Ralph Barkeley, 42; Milton H. Lough, 23, and Ray A. Osberg, 20, a "trustee." Sheriff Kilgore said Barkeley, who was serving a year's sentence for petit larceny in a safe-cracking case, was an Indian from Klamath.

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## Mother's Plea For Doomed Son Fails

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Clemency hopes of the youngest inmate ever to face death on Washington State gallows were dimmer today.

Governor Wallgren rejected yesterday the tearful pleas of the mother of 17-year-old Joseph Henry Malish of Vancouver that he commute the death sentence imposed on the youth for the fatal stabbing a year ago of La Donna Toscan, 17. Young Malish is scheduled to be hanged Jan. 9.

The governor explained that he felt that, where a fair trial has been held and no new evidence has been produced, "the governor should not act without the aid of the sitting judge and the prosecuting attorney."

"I do not especially favor capital punishment," he said after the interview with Mrs. Frederick Malish, the mother, "but it happens to be the law of the state and I raised my right hand and swore to carry out its laws."

Louis Schaefer, attorney for the condemned youth, quoted the Clark County prosecutor, DeWitt Jones, as having said that if he were a private citizen he would not hesitate to write the governor asking for clemency, but in his official capacity he did not believe he should until asked by the governor.

Schaefer said the appeal for clemency was based on Joseph's youth, his previous good behavior and that he was abnormal mentally. A jury held the youth to be sane at his trial.

Store owner Chester Klingman purchased it from the Army Medical Corps. The corps had paid \$900 for it but they didn't know what it was. Neither did the manufacturer, whom Klingman wrote.

"We don't know what it is," a reply said. "The Army asked for it and gave us a plan for making it."

Several physicians were stumped.

One commented: "It might have been intended for use in cauterizing wounds but you could never cauterize a wound with it."

So Klingman has set the price at \$45. "The electric motor and generator are worth that," he said.
