New officers will be installed at the Woman's Society of the First Presbyterian Church Thursday afternoon, January 8,

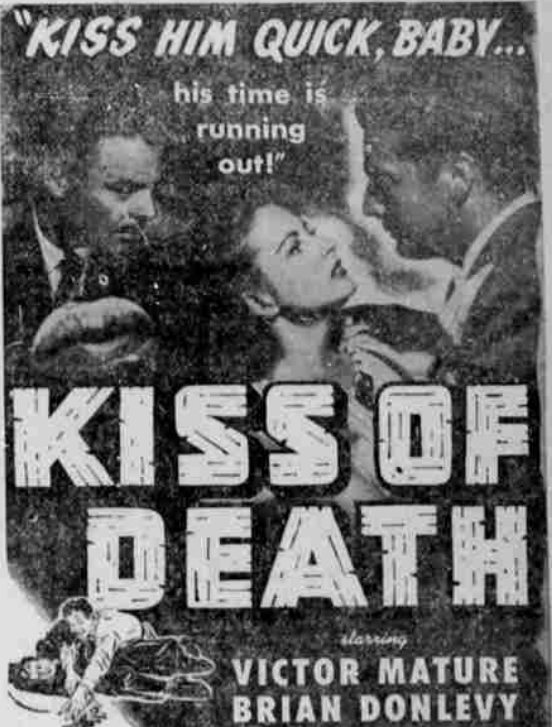
