

Huskies Defeat Bears; Ducks Lose, Beavers Triumph

(By the Associated Press)

It was an even Stephen, pay-per-view - money - and - take - your choice proposition today in figuring the comparative strength of the Coast Conference's Northern and Southern divisions as the result of last night's pre-season basketball games.

Washington's Huskies upheld the honor of the North with a 54-51 victory over the Golden Bears of California, but had the advantage of playing on their home floor.

The Oregon Ducks, however, ran into rough-sledding at San Francisco and bowed to the classy Stanford Indians, 52-45. The defeat was Oregon's third in 13 starts.

Oregon State, the only other Northern conference entry to see action last night, won its 10th straight game of the season by routing out Portland University, 43-44.

The Huskies scored a mild upset in shading the powerful Berkeley squad which has been touted as a strong contender for the Southern division crown.

The count was tied four times in the first half before Washington took a 26-21 lead at the intermission, and then was knotted three times in the second period.

A spurt sparked by little Bob Engstrom, sub forward, out the Ducks in front by 11 points—a margin that proved barely enough as the Bears staged a great comeback in the final minutes.

Sammy White, fleet Washington forward, took scoring honors with 18 points. George Walker topped California with 14.

Ducks Once in Lead

The veteran Stanford team was pressed closely by Oregon, but the Ducks could never regain the lead they took midway in the first period and held until three minutes before the half.

Oregon closed the gap to 45-43 with five minutes to go, but bogged down when Stan Williamson, star guard, fouled out. Roger Wiley, the Ducks' towering center, was high man with 17 points, most of which were scored in the first half. Stanford led at halftime, 32-25.

Oregon State, paced by forward Norm Carey with 17 points, was ahead of the Portland Pilots all the way although the Beavers were outscored in the second half. The Staters were in front at the intermission, 23-16. Cliff Crandall, high-scoring Beaver forward, was held to 12 points.

Variety of Sports In 1947 Enjoyed At Vets Hospital

The men of the Roseburg Veterans hospital during the past 12 months have enjoyed an expanded sports program of active, passive and spectacular events, Joseph C. Toman, hospital athletic director, reports.

In the active program, more than half of the men took part in such activities as softball, horseshoes, basketball, touch football, golf, tennis, badminton, tether ball, and hiking and fishing.

The passive program includes functions for those who are not able to participate in the active program. This phase includes sports movies, sports quizzes, sport broadcasts, smokers, and talks by sports celebrities.

The spectacular program provides an opportunity for the men to watch contests off the hospital area or to witness games between competing teams on the hospital grounds. Such events as football games, basketball games, track meets, baseball and soft-

ball games are attended by the men.

The Roseburg public schools have donated to the men tickets for their various contests. Local organizations are most cooperative in this way. Prizes for the winners of sports contests have been donated by the VFW auxiliary and the Elks Club.

The 1948 sports program at the hospital will continue to include the above activities with emphasis on intramural competition between wards. Leagues in softball, tennis, badminton, horse shoes, volleyball and table tennis are planned.

A nine-hole golf course is now under construction, a putting green is available for clock golf and pitch and putt and a driving range is being built.

Miss Graham arrived here this week from England in answer to Satterlee's mail proposal last April. She and the first Mrs. Satterlee were close friends and on the latter's death two years ago, she and Satterlee continued

the correspondence the two women had maintained since the first world war.

Mrs. Ada C. Neville Dies Near Yoncalla

Ada Cellers Neville, 73, died at the home of her brother, Ben Cellers, near Yoncalla, Jan. 1 after a long illness. She was born in Hamburg, Iowa, Feb. 8, 1874, and had lived in Oregon most of her life.

Panama Canal Zone Red Activity to Be Probed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Chairman Thomas (R-N, J.) announced Friday that the House committee on un-American activities will make an on the spot investigation into this month of "Communist infiltration" in the Panama canal zone.

The Panama inquiry will be part of a five-point program the committee has outlined for immediate consideration. This includes a resumption of the investigation of Communist influences in Hollywood and hearings on attempts to steal atom bomb information, to indoctrination of Negro troops with Communism and the spread of Fascism.

Praise Given New Service Station

Public opening of the city's newest service station at S. Stephens and Waite Sts. is set for Tuesday, Jan. 6, it was announced today by Standard Stations, Inc.
