Slayer of Two Women Admits 10 Other Murders

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Undersheriff Joseph Karpach said Saturday that Jake Bird, axe-slayer of two Tacoma women, has admitted the murder of 10 other persons during his 20-year wanderings through the Midwest.

Bird's confessions were contained in a dictated confession which he signed in his Walla Walla penitentiary death cell where he is to hang Jan. 16 for the axe-slaying of Mrs. Bertha Kludt here Oct. 30. Mrs. Kludt's daughter, Jane, was also killed when she attempted to defend her mother.

Karpach's list of Bird's admitted crimes included the following slayings:

Harvey Boyd, 8, at East Omaha, Iowa, in June, 1928, for which Clarence Luckhart has served 19 years of a life sentence in the Iowa penitentiary.

J. W. Blackman, Omaha, Neb., on Nov. 18, 1928.

Mrs. Waldo Resso and her sister, Creta Brown, 19, on Nov. 19, 1928. On Nov. 21st Bird attempted to murder Harold Strubling in Carter Lake, Iowa, a suburb of Omaha, for which he was apprehended and served 12 years in the Iowa penitentiary.

Alta Fulkerson, 36, Highland Park, Ill., on June 24, 1942.

An unnamed, retired railroad watchman, his wife and their 18-year-old son, at South Bend, Ind., in Sept., 1942.

Mrs. Marie Manners, 81, at Pueblo, Colo., on Oct. 1, 1947.

Lee K. Walker in Ogden, Utah, on Oct. 4, 1947.

The 45-year-old Negro transient indicated he had further disclosures to make, Karpach said.

Italy-U.S. Aid Accord

Mrs. Reeves, Washington
Secretary of State, Dies

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Mrs. Belle Reeves, 77, died Friday after serving nearly 10 years as Secretary of State.

Her appointment as Secretary of State was made by Gov. Clarence D. Martin on Feb. 7, 1938, to fill the vacancy created by the death of Dr. Ernest N. Hutchinson. She was elected to the office in 1940, and in the 1944 election led the Democratic ticket with the largest vote ever cast in Washington for a state official.

Her political career, lasting over a quarter of a century, began with her election to the State House of Representatives in 1922.

She had served uninterruptedly as a member of the legislature from Chelan county until she was named Secretary of State.
