ELGAROSE P.T.A. TO MEET SATURDAY NIGHT

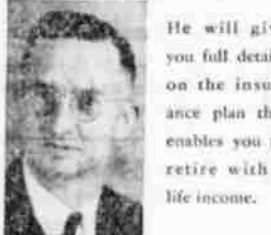

CINCINNATI, Jan. 8.—A raging fire that shot flames hundreds of feet into the air gutted the three upper stories of historic Turner hall, on the edge of uptown Cincinnati early today.

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Estonians, Barred From U. S., Given Home in Canada

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Found, at last—a home for a rugged band of Estonians who crossed the Atlantic in a 43-foot sail boat last summer, but were refused admission to the United States.

Well, it was announced today that the Estonians, 24 men, women and children, will arrive at Kitchener, Ontario, January 15th to live. The Canadian Lutheran World Religion Committee is sponsoring the Estonians, and a three-story house has been prepared for them. Members of the committee said that work has been found for most of the adult members of the group.

The Estonians were barred from the United States—and long held at New York's Ellis Island—because the American immigration quota for Estonians had been filled. The hardy group was given six months' temporary admission to the United States to enable it to find a home in some other country. Now the group has found it.

Ex-Football Star One of Victims Of Double Slaying

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Discovery of the unmarked bodies of two Alaska men, apparently killed together in a home in the isolated Bristol Bay settlement of Dillingham, confronted authorities today with what appeared to be a clueless mystery.

The victims were Harold W. (Tubby) Griffin, 45, former professional football player and bus-

nessman, and Martin Ernestus, 42, fisherman and cannery worker.

Mrs. Griffin, found in the Ernestus home with the two dead men, was reported in a critical condition at Kakanak. A visitor from Dillingham reported she has a fractured wrist and a possible skull fracture.

Bodies of the two men were flown here by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents yesterday. Neither man had been knifed or shot, the FBI said, and a four-hour autopsy failed to disclose the cause of death. Their organs will be sent to the FBI laboratory.

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
