### Taft Prefers Bank Plan For Crecking Credits

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said today the American Bankers' Association plan for checking inflationary bank credit is "better than any attempt by the government to say what is a good loan and what is a bad loan."

One section of the president's cost-of-living program calls for statutory controls on bank credit.

Besides encouraging savings and investment in government savings bonds, the ABA has expressed hope that the nation's 15,000 banks will join in:

Allowing no commodity and inventory loans designed to withhold essential goods from normal market channels in anticipation of price rises; discouragement of mortgages for non-essential building or construction until supplies and labor are more available; and

### Dock Strike at Hamburg Diverts U. S. Food Ships

HAMBURG, Germany, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Three Allied ships bound for the British zone of Germany—one of them the U. S. Lines American Veteran bearing gift packages for Germans—were diverted to other European ports today as a wildcat strike of 12,000 Hamburg stevedores entered its fourth day.

Trade union officials refused again today to back the stevedores who are protesting against lowered rations, but assured the men they would do all possible to see that their extra-food ration was maintained.

### Testing Program Seeks New Fruit For Oregon Use

Fruit and nut varieties from every section of the nation and from Canada, England, China, Japan and Asia will be tested at the Oregon State college experiment station beginning this year as a part of the station's expanded fruit and nut research project.

The purpose of the long-range project is to improve Oregon's fruit and nut crop, valued at more than \$90,000,000 in 1946, by introducing and testing promising new varieties here from other states and countries. Dr. Quentin B. Zielinski, associate horticulturist, is project leader.

"New and improved varieties are necessary to meet the ever-present competition from other

areas, to cope with changing consumer demand, and to insure Oregon's place among the leaders in fruit and nut production," Dr. Zielinski said in outlining project plans.

Under the improvement program, selections from other states will be gathered and studied at the college. Varieties that prove adapted to certain horticultural areas of the state will then be sent to branch experiment stations and experimental areas for actual field testing.

After foundation stocks have been established, breeding experiments will be initiated in an attempt to develop varieties that are especially suited to growing conditions in various parts of the state.

Chestnut varieties from China and Japan, cherries from England and Canada, walnuts from Afghanistan, Asia, will be studied along with other promising selections from other state experiment stations. Varieties have been received from Minnesota, Virginia, New York, Georgia, Maryland, California, Washington, Philadelphia once had a law forbidding the sale of coal in the city limits.

**Ham Loaves with Catsup Gravy**

Broadcast: January 10, 1948

1/2 cup rolled oats 2 tablespoons hot shortening  
1/2 cup Pet Milk 1/2 cup catsup  
1 teaspoon dry mustard 2 teaspoons vinegar  
1 lb. ground smoked ham 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 cup finely cut onion 1/2 cup water (2 can catsup)  
2 teaspoons sugar

Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Mix together and let stand 5 minutes oats, milk and mustard. Mix in ham. Divide among 4 greased 3-in. muffin tins or custard cups. Bake 45 min., or until brown. Turn out. Cook onion slowly in shortening 5 min. Add remaining ingredients. Boil slowly 3 min. Serve over ham loaves. Makes 4 servings.

\* 1/4 cup soft bread crumbs can replace the oats.

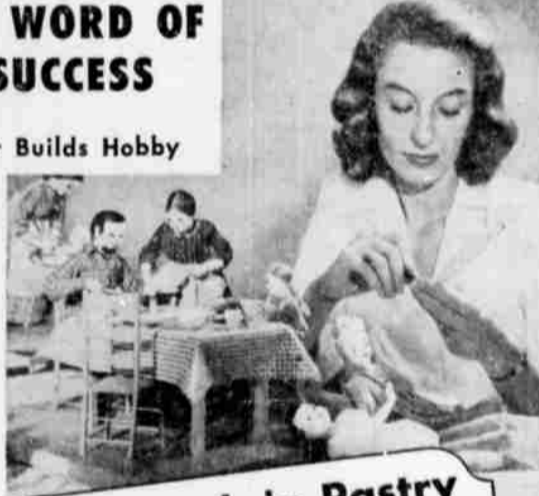
