

Traveling Freight Agent Assigned To Roseburg By S. P.

T. J. "Tom" McCarty, has been assigned to the Roseburg district by the Southern Pacific Co. as traveling freight and passenger agent. It was announced today by R. H. Holmes, district freight and passenger agent, Medford, who was in Roseburg to install McCarty in his new position. The addition is being made to the Roseburg staff, Holmes said, "to improve service to shippers and travelers of Roseburg and the Umpqua basin."

McCarty will be joined by Mrs. McCarty as soon as living quarters can be secured in Roseburg.

"Establishment of the new position is recognition by the Southern Pacific Co. of the rapidly growing importance of Roseburg and the entire Umpqua basin," Holmes said.

With headquarters in Roseburg at the S. P. freight station, McCarty will supervise freight and passenger traffic in the Umpqua area, including Riddle on the

south and Sutherlin and Oakland on the north.

Rose From Clerkship

He is well qualified for the position, according to Holmes. Joining the Southern Pacific July 1, 1936, McCarty was employed as a stenographer in the company's office at Vancouver, B. C., and soon was advanced to general clerk. In June, 1943, he was promoted to the general passenger department in Portland, where he held a responsible position in connection with the movement of heavy war traffic.

In May, 1944, McCarty was transferred to the company's freight department and promoted to the position of chief clerk in the Seattle office. Two years later he was advanced to city freight agent in Portland, which position he held until his transfer to Roseburg.

Bandits Talked Too Much

The robbery occurred in mid-morning and less than four hours later the Ricketts men and Hassenback were behind bars on charges of armed robbery.

The charge is punishable by death in Louisiana.

U.S. Navy Too Small to Win War, Chief Declares

would take to gather experienced men and place them aboard ship, Denfeld said. He added:

"Fortunately we have a large and effective naval reserve, most of whom are war-trained veterans." The naval reserve numbers about 898,000 officers and men. "We will need planes as much as we will need men," Denfeld said. "And the speed with which planes can be placed aboard our

reserve carriers depends upon how fast American industry and labor can build them. It's a slow process that might take at least two years."

Carriers Undermanned

The Navy is so short of enlisted men that it could not put both its giant aircraft carriers to sea without borrowing from other ships, says Rear Adm. Thomas L. Sprague.

One of the 45,000-ton flattops, the Midway, is now in the Mediterranean. The other, the Franklin D. Roosevelt, is at Norfolk, Va., for a minor overhaul.

Sprague told a reporter that the Navy is undergoing a tremendous turnover in enlisted personnel, with its strength down to 362,000 from last July's peak of 434,000—and the low point still ahead.
