

Lynam, Stojack To Battle For Coast Mat Title

Joe Lynam, after his hard fought but impressive victory in a seven-man single-elimination wrestling tournament here last week, will be a popular favorite to defeat Frankie Stojack when the ex-WSC football star places his coast junior-heavyweight title on the block at the Roseburg Armory Saturday.

Lynam, the rugged Redmond athlete, won the right to the title shot the hard way, defeating Jack O'Reilly in the opener, taking a split decision from Georges Durette in the semi-final, and taking the measure of tough Al Williams in the finale. The ovation given Lynam when he received the trophy was an indication of

his vast popularity with Douglas County mat followers.

Because Matchmaker Don Owen has been forced to give Stojack a \$500 guarantee for the title defense, only one other match will be booked—a red hot affair between Tex Hager, the popular Oregonian, and Joe Dorsett, the rough and tough New York Italian.

Stojack, who won the title from Boston Jackie Nichols before 3000 fans at Yakima recently, is a native of Washington. He operates a cabinet shop at Tacoma and has announced he would leave his business only to make title defenses. "I'm not going to follow the wrestling circuit, but whenever you have a worthy opponent, I'll be happy to come to Oregon for a championship match," he said. He plans to continue his work at home and train after business hours.

Harlem Loopers Dated in Roseburg Against J. V. R.'s

If the Harlem Globetrotters were not the sensational playing team they are with the greatest record of any traveling basketball team in the annals of basketball, they'd still be a terrific drawing card for their showmanship and stunting ability, as Roseburg fans will see for themselves Tuesday, Jan. 20, when the Negro loopers face the Roseburg J.V.R. team at the Senior High School gym.

The colored wizards of the court can do almost everything with a basketball but make it talk, and even their rapid-fire passing is a show in itself.

In fact, the fun starts the moment the Trotters take the floor for warm-up practice. They form a circle near one of the baskets and go through some fancy passes. Once the game has started, the Globetrotters make victory their immediate goal in an effort to improve their dazzling record of 2,886 wins and 225 defeats in the past 20 seasons.

But sooner or later the Trotters perform such tricks as spinning the ball on their finger tips, rolling it down their arms and legs, and passing it between the legs of the opponents.

Still they never intend to make the opposition look foolish. The little tricks are done in subtle and cute fashion and even the opposing players get a kick out of it.

OSC Basketeers Take Revenge on Idaho, 59-39

MOSEBOW, Ind., Jan. 14.—(AP)—Winner of three of four games on its first conference trip, Oregon State College, defending title holder, returned home today after its 59-39 victory over Idaho last night atop the Northern Division Coast Conference standings.

The Beavers cut loose with a speedy attack to avenge their previous night's defeat by Idaho, and in one 15-minute stage held the Vandals to four points. Oregon State led at the half, 28 to 12.

High point honors went to Norm Carey, Oregon State forward, who counted 18 points, 14 in the first half. The game was close only the first five minutes, although as the second half opened Idaho also matched the Beavers' basket for basket the first eight minutes.

Jack Phoenix, towering Idaho center, led his team's scoring with 13 points.

Charles K.O.'s Moore to Earn Chance at Title

CLEVELAND, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Ezzard Charles was virtually certain today of a shot at the light heavyweight title after chilling Archie Moore, the No. 2 contender, at the arena last night. Ebony Ezzard blasted Moore to

the canvas for the full count in the eighth round of a scheduled 15-rounder to maintain his National Boxing Association rating as the leading challenger for the crown.

All previous efforts to arrange a match between the Cincinnati cloutier and Champion Gus Lesnevich were fruitless, but NBA President Abe Greene recently announced that body would call upon the winner of the Lesnevich-Billy Fox fight March 5 to defend the title against the winner of last night's bout.
