

Oregon G.O.P. Vote on Gen. Eisenhower Slated

Philadelphia June 21 will be entered in New Hampshire and Wisconsin.

Opposing the New York governor in New Hampshire will be slates backing Eisenhower and Harold E. Stassen, former governor of Minnesota. The state will pick eight delegates March 9.

In Wisconsin on April 6, Dewey, 1944 Republican presidential nominee, will be entered against fields supporting MacArthur and Stassen. The state has 27 delegate votes.

Oregon Leads Off

Dewey's decision to test his strength first against the World War 2 supreme Army commanders in the European and Pacific theater became known here less than 24 hours after he had announced his availability for the nomination through an aide.

James C. Hagerty made the "authorized" announcement late yesterday in commenting on the entry of Dewey's name in the Oregon primary, which will sel-

ect 12 convention delegates May 21.

Hagerty said the governor "warmly appreciates the support and loyalty of his many friends in Oregon." Then Hagerty went on:

"He is fully engaged with the work of the legislative session and cannot actively seek the nomination of his party for president, but if nominated would accept."

Forced Into Open
Dewey has been aggressively but privately seeking the presidential nomination since early last summer. His open entry in to the contest took Albany by surprise, however, as it had been stated authoritatively several times in the last few months that he would not become an avowed aspirant.

The shift in strategy was viewed here as a reflection of a lately developed belief by the governor's advisers that he would have to get his candidacy out in the open if he were to head off Eisenhower and the previously declared candidates.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said yesterday he welcomes the announcement that Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York is available for the Republican presidential nomination. Taft himself is an avowed candidate.

"I think Governor Dewey's announcement is to be commended," Taft said when told that an aide of the governor had said that Dewey would accept if nominated.

"The more candidates whose names will be before the convention, the better it will be for the party," Taft added in an interview.

DENVER, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Gen. Jonathan Wainwright, retired, of Bataan and Corregidor fame, voiced the opinion yesterday it would be "a mistake" for either Gen. Eisenhower or Gen. MacArthur to accept presidential nomination if offered to them.

In response to a question from a reporter, Wainwright said both generals "are fine soldiers and I think it would be a mistake for them to get into politics. No grand, good soldier ever made a good politician."

crease and now stands 163 per cent higher than in prewar years.

The steady drain on fish and game life by an increasing number of hunters and anglers, while replacements from hatcheries and game farms dropped to one half, greatly damaged Oregon's fish and game population, Lockwood said.

In 1943, the commission set up a postwar program of hatchery construction and improvement, earmarking its accumulated surplus of funds for that purpose. But material shortages and labor costs have prevented much of the work planned by the commission, and, at present costs the commission will not be able to execute more than about one half of the projects planned. If sportsmen want the program executed in full, he explained, it will be necessary to provide funds to offset shrinkage in dollar values.

Hatcheries Have Priority
Because stations could not be properly maintained during war years, Lockwood said, the commission is striving to get its hatcheries and farms back into proper shape as its first activity. It is doubling fish hatchery capacity as rapidly as possible.

The Rock Creek hatchery, on the North Umpqua River, Lockwood said, has been designated for improvements expected to cost approximately \$100,000 during the current year, while reconstruction of the Diamond Lake trout hatchery also is on the year's improvement program.

Lockwood told the commission's accomplishments in screening irrigation ditches and canals in Jackson and Josephine counties, "resulting in the saving of more fish than could be produced in all the hatcheries in that area."

The commission, he said, is working to "take advantage of every mile of spawning water in our 1600 miles of streams" believing that hatcheries only supplement natural spawning. Consequently much money is being used to clear obstructions, and improve streams for spawning purposes.

Game Objectives Told
Lockwood explained the commission's program of big game management, stating that special seasons on deer and elk, some of which have resulted in much criticism, have been based on keeping herds confined to areas where they would not cause damage to farmers, and also to keep populations limited to the amount of available feed.

The rapid recovery of antelope herds, following reductions caused by an epidemic, may result in opening the antelope season again soon, he said.

The commission is greatly concerned with the bird situation, populations having been reduced because of June rains for several successive years. Reduction of cover in agricultural areas, losses

from operation of farm machinery and automobiles, killing countless thousands of birds in their nests and on highways, coupled with natural predation and poaching make the bird situation extremely critical, he said.

Patrol Force Too Small

Commenting upon the matter of law enforcement, he said that the commission, while paying \$265,000 annually into the state police fund, has no authority over state police activities. Because game belongs to the public, he believes that the cost of protection should be paid from public funds and not from game funds.

In considering the enforcement problem, he said, it should be taken into consideration that licenses have increased 163 per cent, that thousands more hunters and anglers are enjoying their respective sports, and that the force of officers is entirely too small to patrol the state.

Lockwood spoke before a large audience of sportsmen at a "homecoming" celebration staged for the supervisor, a former Roseburg resident. Prior to the public meeting, he was entertained at a dinner attended by club officers.

whom the facts haven't been brought home."

He pointed out that the title of the bill has created opposition. He explained, "Universal means everyone—you, you, and me. Military means war—and the Legion know war best and hate it most. Training means discipline and regimentation—which our young men hate."

Fine Example Cited
Maris cited the experiences of a Portland youth who had gone through six months of training at the experimental UMT camp at Ft. Knox, Ky., recently, and the benefits he and his comrades had derived from the training.

When interviewed by Legion officials at Portland, the boy was preparing to enter a four-year college course at the expense of the United States government, because he had elected a course that "would be of use to the military if and when we ever go to war again."

The boy told the Legionnaires

that religious training was included in the UMT program, but it was not forced, 90 per cent of the 17 and 18-year-old youths attended religious services of various faiths. "I defy you to find one community where 90 per cent of the youth are in church," Maris said.

Pleads For European Aid

Maris' speech was preceded by the talk of Mrs. Ruth Coyner of Bend, department president of the Legion Auxiliary, who also told of the UMT camp at Ft. Knox, and what she had learned of it at the national convention, which she attended last year.

Mrs. Coyner also made a strong plea for the relief of the people of Europe and reminded her listeners of the bonds of sympathy that link the mothers of two continents. She described the trip made by national Legion officers last year to visit the graves of American dead, and emphasized that the graves are given loving care by the European people.
