

Title at Stake In Stojack-Lynam Mat Tilt Tonight

A capacity crowd of wrestling fans is expected at the Roseburg Armory tonight when Frankie Stojack makes his local debut in defense of his newly won Pacific Coast junior heavyweight championship. His challenger will be Joe Lynam, native Oregonian from Redmond, who won the right by taking the trophy in a seven-man single elimination tournament here last week.

Stojack, former Washington State College football and wrestling star, is the new mat sensation of the Northwest. His airplane spin, a hold which he uses for most triumphs, is considered the most effective in the business. Lynam, the former Australian titleholder and all-around athlete, displayed his ability to annex the coveted crown here last week—winning a seven-man tournament from a field of top-flight rivals.

The only other match, limited because of a \$500 guarantee to Stojack, will be a one-hour battle between Tex Hager, the "Crescent Cyclone," and Joe Dorsett, the rugged New York Italian. The opener gets under way at 8:30 p.m.

Elton Owen will referee both matches.

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Roseburg Indians 37-to-33 Victors Over Myrtle Point

The Roseburg High School Indians defeated the Myrtle Point Bobcats, 37 to 33, in a rough, fast basketball game, Friday night on the Myrtle Point floor. Leading in scoring after the first minute of play, the Indians had a 21 to 12 lead at half-time, but had a real battle holding the fighting Bobcats in a wild third-period rally.

Myrtle Point cut down Roseburg's lead to 26-21 by the close of the third quarter, but the Indians came back in the early part of the fourth period to roll in nine points in quick succession. Myrtle Point, however, continued to whittle away at the lead, and during the last four minutes the two teams were separated by only four points.

Defensive work by Darrel Blank in controlling H. Lowellen, Myrtle Point's scoring ace, was only two points, was the feature of the game. After Blank went out of the game on fouls early in the fourth quarter, Lowellen added nine points to his tally for the evening.

Piper and Taylor, both of Roseburg, shared high scoring honors, each putting 12 points. Taylor connected twice with mid-court shots. Piper kept the Indians in front in the closing minutes of the game with two sensational field goals from the corners. H. Lowellen with 11 points and Hatfield with 10 were high scorers for Myrtle Point.

The Indians play again tonight at Myrtle Point.
