

New Tourist Camp At Winchester Bay Opened to Public

Open house was held at Umpqua Stockades, a new tourist camp at Winchester Bay, Saturday and Sunday, celebrating completion of 11 cabins and opening the resort for service to the local and traveling public.

E. F. Maher, who with A. N. Whitman, is joint owner-manager of The Stockades, was in Roseburg today and reports plans to start six more cabins immediately, with the hope of having them open by July 1.

The camp is built to resemble one of the early-day forts built for protection against Indians. Cabins are of vertical pole construction, but have modern interiors.

Unique furniture has been built in the workshop operated by Maher and Whitman.

They have designed a combination stand, desk and table, a special suitcase rack, an illuminated vanity, and other articles of furniture built from native woods.

Eleanor Roosevelt Will Campaign for Truman

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—The Democratic high command has asked Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt to campaign for President Truman's election next November and has received assurances of her willingness to cooperate.

Confirming this, Chairman McGrath told a reporter he also expects James A. Farley, who broke with the late President Roosevelt in 1940 over the third term issue, to become active again during the campaign.

Farley already has made one speech, in which he prophesied that Henry Wallace's Independent presidential venture may end "as a one-man party."

No Depression Impends, Anderson Tells Farmers

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Anderson yesterday described this country's efforts in boom world trade as the "strongest single indication" that farmers will not have to return to restrictive production practices.

An expanding market abroad for surpluses will be possible, he said, if success meets this country's goal of greater and greater world commerce.

In his annual report to President Truman, the cabinet officer said many farmers fear that their present period of record prosperity will be followed by a major depression when the current world food shortage ends.

Much of this fear is based, he said, on their memory of the farm depression that followed World War I after this country decided to "withdraw from the world economy."

Jet Racing Cars Slated For Series at Armory

The miniature jet race cars will have at it again at the Armory Sunday, Feb. 1, in a series of six scheduled races. Carl Fair, sponsor of the races, has arranged to hold an event every other week from Feb. 1 to April 11.

In the next race, said Fair, the cars will be classified into three divisions—stock models, weighing more than one ounce, those less than one ounce, and original designs. In the first races of the new series, models will be awarded to the winners. There will be separate prizes for each division.

Another improvement over the races of the 11th will be the use of an electrically-controlled stopwatch, with graduations of 1/20 of a second or smaller. As in the last race, the cars will be run diagonally across the Armory floor and timed for a distance of 50 feet.

House Votes \$800,000 For Klamath Indians

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—(AP)—The House passed yesterday and sent to the Senate legislation to authorize distribution of approximately \$800,000 a month Klamath Indians of Oregon.

The House Public Lands Committee said between 1,500 and 1,600 members of the tribe will be credited with \$500 each.

The bill provides the allotment may be used to buy and improve land, erect homes, buy household equipment, building material, feed, seed and grain, repair farm equipment and supplies necessary to engage in farming.

POLIO HOSPITALS NEEDED
PORTLAND, Jan. 20.—(AP)—A National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis official told state health officials here that the state needs additional convalescent hospitals.

Oregon's program for combating polio epidemics was praised by Dr. Kenneth S. Zanebauer, New York. He said the hospital facilities could also be used for cases of rheumatic heart disease, tuberculosis and chronic bone infections.

Low Wallace to Again Try for Governorship

PORTLAND, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Wallace, Democratic National Committeeman for Oregon, yesterday announced he would be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor in the May primaries.

Wallace, nominated for the position in 1942, was defeated by Earl Snell in the general election. Last week Wallace said he would not seek reelection to the post of national committeeman.

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
