

Negro Law Student Case Goes Back to High Court

will not attempt to enroll in the newly created law school but will stand pat on her application for

enrollment at the state university, Dunjee said.

Accompanied by Dunjee and NCAA officials, she visited the state university at Norman yesterday morning and filed application to enroll.

A few hours after her application was accepted, the State

Regents announced at a special meeting the establishment of a Negro school of law here as a branch of Langston University, the state's only Negro college at Langston, Okla.

An honor graduate at Langston University, Mrs. Fisher first sought to enroll in the State University Law School two years ago. Denied admission because of the state's law requiring separate schools for Negroes, she appealed to the state courts and finally to the U. S. Supreme Court.

German Lawyers Cited For Contempt Apologize

NUERNBERG, Germany, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Five attorneys cited for contempt of court in the Krupp war crimes case apologized for their conduct today, but a sixth—who became a Nazi party member in 1933—refused to do so.

The court completed two days of hearings and announced its sentence will be handed down tomorrow.

Guenter Gelseler, 38, assistant counsel for Alfred Krupp himself, told the judges he believed his action was correct last Friday and that he saw no reason to apologize.

The six walked out of the courtroom in protest against the court's refusal to permit a colleague, Alfred Shill, to proceed with a motion. It was a motion that had been denied three times before.

Heiress Seeks Divorce From Count De Marigny

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Nancy Oakes De Marigny, 23-year-old heiress to the gold mine fortune of her slain father, Sir Harry Oakes, has brought suit to annul her marriage to Count Alfred De Marigny. It was disclosed yesterday.

De Marigny, 41, was acquitted in 1943 of bludgeoning Oakes to death at Nassau in the Bahamas. Mrs. De Marigny expressed belief in his innocence throughout the long trial.

Secret Force Ouster, State Police Wanted

JACKSON, Miss., Jan. 20.—(AP)—Governor Fielding L. Wright asked the Mississippi legislature today to give him a permanent state police force to replace the temporary secret force created last November to combat strike violence.

He wants a permanent state police force because, he said, "there has been a breakdown in law enforcement in our state to such an extent as to be alarming. . . . Conditions are deplorable. . . . should not longer be tolerated."

Wright, who became governor 14 months ago on the death of the late Gov. Thomas L. Bailey, was inaugurated today for a full four-year term.

The temporary secret police, the Mississippi Bureau of Investigation, is scheduled to go out of existence July 6 unless a new appropriation is made.

uniformly throughout the nation. But there was some objection to Knutson's proposal for percentage cuts ranging from 30 percent at the bottom to 10.5 percent for those with high-bracket incomes. The best guess was that these percentages would be trimmed all along the scale.

Republican spokesmen have adopted the view that upping of the personal exemption along with the community tax plan will appeal to the largest number of taxpayers and voters and will soften objections to some reduction for high bracket individuals.

statement:

"There is no evidence or claim that the defendant did not receive a fair trial. There is no indication that racial prejudice had any part in the case."

He said the power to commute should "be exercised only for the purpose of preventing miscarriage of justice, such as a showing that the accused did not have a fair trial or every opportunity to present a defense, the presentation of newly discovered evidence since completing the trial, or other extenuating circumstances."

Governor Hall said he received 103 letters asking for clemency, but that most of them are based on the fact that the writers are opposed to capital punishment.

He said that if they feel so keenly about it, they should initiate a measure to abolish capital punishment.

The governor said he read the entire record of the case, read every letter, and held a lengthy hearing on the matter, and could find nothing to warrant changing the jury's verdict.

Henderson has been spending his time in prison doing oil paintings, copying pictures from calendars.

The last commutations of death sentences were granted by former Governor Julius Meier on July 3, 1934, to Theodore Jordan, a Negro, and Harry Riley.

Jordan had been sentenced to die for the murder of a Southern Pacific dining car steward in Klamath Falls.

Riley had received the death penalty for a triple murder, having killed his wife, father-in-law, and mother-in-law at Burns.

streets at municipal expense.

"What is an unimproved street?" he asked. "Is it possible to grade them? Is there a grader available to do the job. What's the answer to the problem?"

Councilman Percy Croft—as the "most conversant with the street problem"—said that in the past, it has been a practice for the city to rent a grader from the county and to grade the streets once or twice a year.

Mayor Albert G. Flegel pointed out that it is going to be a "very severe expense" to operate a grader full time and at the first reduction of street department funds, the grader work would have to be eliminated.

When queried for his opinion, City Attorney A. N. Orcutt recalled that it has been a custom for many years that once a city street has been improved—that is, paved—it has been the duty of the city to maintain that street. It is, however, only custom, as there is no charter provision for such a policy.

All street paving has been at the expense of adjacent property

owners, he said, except for the original 20 blocks of paving on Jackson St., which was borne partially at the expense of the city.

The mayor observed that it is "not the inability of the grader, but the shortage of manpower" which prevents maintenance of many unimproved streets. It was stated that persons who reside on unimproved streets may purchase gravel, and have it spread by the city's grader.

Would Shed One Job

A letter from Fire Chief Glenn H. Taylor asking to be relieved of his duties as city building inspector was read to the council. No action was taken.

Appointment of Harry N. Hagman, who presently resides outside the city, as a city policeman was approved.

Attorney Carl Felker appeared in behalf of the American Legion to learn whether construction of a Legion hall on S. Kane St. would be permissible under the zoning ordinance. The Legion has acquired an option for the purchase of a lot adjacent to its present building site on E. Cass St., which would front on S. Kane. The matter was referred to the City Planning Commission.

Felker also appeared in behalf of Eugene Krewson, operator of the Rainbow Grill, for the renewal of a restaurant license, first issued more than a year ago, as required by the State Liquor Commission. Krewson plans to construct additional facilities at his establishment, but was unable to proceed last year.

Carlos Page was granted permission to move his building on N. Jackson St., which has been used for office purposes, to E. 6th St. and E. 2nd Ave. N., where it will be remodeled for a dwelling.

To a letter from the Eagles Lodge, requesting the installation of public rest rooms at the armory, the mayor said that work has been relieved from Brig. Gen. R. G. Olson, adjutant general, that the matter will be taken up by the Oregon General Staff.

this area is national," he added, and he named railroads, power companies, and industries which are drawing the attention of the country to the West Coast in

their advertising.

The second was the railroad migration, which began in 1863 and lasted 40 years. The third great migration, which started just before the recent war, is under way now.

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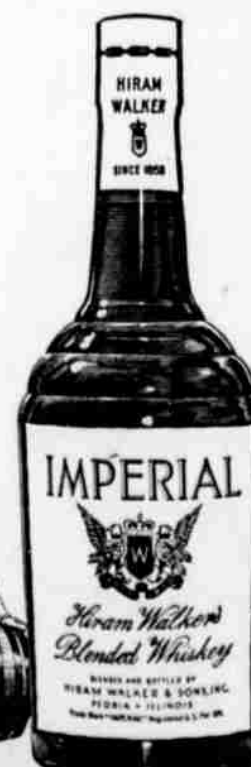
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
