Funeral Arranged for Logging Tragedy Victim

Rex Melvin Cooley, 44, killed by a falling tree Monday, while working for Thiel Bros., east of Yoncalla, was born in Washougal, Wash., October 4, 1903. He had lived in the Sutherlin vicinity for about 40 days and had been a resident of Oregon for almost his entire life.

He was married in Vancouver, Wash., in July, 1944, to Miss Belva Hammond. Surviving him are the widow and two children: a son, Ernest Cooley, and a daughter, Virginia May Cooley; his mother, Mrs. Alice E. Dunlap, all of Sutherlin; three brothers and a sister, Clarence Cooley, Stevenson, Wash.; John Cooley, McMinnville; Hugh Cooley, Eureka, Calif.; Mrs. Nellie Bratton, Sutherlin.

Services will be held in the SDA Church, Sutherlin, at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, with Elder J. Robertson officiating. Interment will be in the Fair Oaks Cemetery. Arrangements are in care of the Stearns Mortuary, Oakland.

Juvenile Court May Take Boy Who Killed Father

BEND, Ore., Jan. 21.—(AP)—Circuit Judge R. S. Hamilton today had under study a motion to parole Cecil Snyder, 11, facing trial in death of his father, to a juvenile court.

The boy was arrested Dec. 18 a few days after his father died from eating a cheese sandwich. Police said the boy told of placing poison in the sandwich because of his father's cruel treatment. Attorneys for the boy have waived grand jury hearing and asked the court to place the case in the juvenile court.

NLRB Swamped With Avalanche of New Cases

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—(AP)—The National Labor Relations Board reported today it was swamped with a record-breaking total of 2,064 new cases during December.

The rush was the greatest in the board's 12-year history. It was attributed in part to the fact that many unions stayed away from the board for months after the Taft-Hartley act became effective last Aug. 22.

This act requires union leaders to sign non-Communist affidavits in order to be eligible for the board's services.
